"STICKERS" CAST 128 THOUSAND VOTES

Two men were running, this week, for mayor of Philadelphia. The one called himself a "Republican," the other a "Democrat."

The Republican, in the eye of election, was dying. His political managers selected another Republican that they thought would make a good candidate for mayor.

The Republican nominee, dying, got 167 thousand votes.

The Democratic nominee, unquestioned of health, got 25 thousand votes.

The Republican substitute, with stickers, got 123 thousand votes.

The total Republican vote, if that is a fair way to put it, got 290 thousand votes. The Democratic vote was slightly more than one eighth.

Of course Philadelphia is not that preponderantly "Republican."

But the incident does show how strongly partisan politics is entrenched in some cities. That a political group on the day of election, could send out an appeal, warning voters not to vote for their candidate, but to vote for another man, suddenly and privately selected, and to secure for this candidate five times as many votes as for the other, unquestioned, candidate, is a unique instance.

It also shows a sheeplike character of votes that is painful.

We do not think it could happen in Ashland, or in most cities of the United States, at least it ought not.
