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**Civic Club Luncheon**  
Covered were laid for sixty three guests at the "No Hostess" luncheon given by the Civic Club Tuesday at one o'clock.

The program was presented in the ball room with the salute to the flag given in opening, and "America the Beautiful" sung, accompanied by Mrs. P. S. Provoost. The usual business meeting was held, and one new member, Mrs. Aileen W. Kay, welcomed.

Mr. McClosky, the principal speaker was then introduced and spoke to an interested group, with efficiency, the key-note, presenting things from the artist's view point.

Two oil paintings of young girls had been hung in the room and these the speaker used in his informal discussion. His own particular method in posing his subjects was brought out; the speaker illustrating, with picture and action, his method. In posing, he placed his subject in comfortable position; then stepped back far enough that no blemishes appeared. That picture he took forward with him, painting what he saw from a distance. He allows subject to relax, while he steps back, but the pose is resumed as he approaches.

It takes from sixteen to eighteen hours on a head, the artist stated. At this point he suggested that questions be asked, which was done. Mr. McClosky told of his training, of his struggles, when his bent was discovered; of his attendance at the school of fine arts; of the invention of a lamp whereby one may paint as easily by night as by day.

He looks for perfection in the subject, paints him in natural pose. In answering the question, "How?" "A twist of the wrist, a wink of the eye, and the blessing of the Lord," was the reply. "Personality is his great interest; Jesus Christ was the greatest personality, so he reads all the lives of Christ he can secure. He urged all to observe nature. "A poet studies the language to express thought by the right word. We are as great as the poet, except he thought it first."

Miss Brewster, county demonstration agent was the second speaker, and her theme was the improvement of the kitchen. She suggested that the club have a contest on kitchen improvement and outlined the plan.

The speaker stated that in a survey of 1500 rural homes in Jackson county that there were very few labor saving devices. She hopes to put on a contest in the county. Some of the points cited upon which to base the comparison were: first, proper lighting; second, correct height of sink or work table; third, refurnishing (as to tiling, papering, painting, etc.); fourth, installation of labor saving devices.

The basis of award would be the biggest improvement for the least amount of money. It would be necessary to keep a record of time and labor saved by each improvement. She urged the use of the government bulletins.

Several weeks of preparation will be necessary for house wives before the contest. Speakers will

have to give addresses on the comparative merits of the various devices that may be used.

It was announced that Miss Brewster will help direct the activities of the Junior Department of the Civic Club.
