PROHS GAINING SAYS CONGRESSMAN

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Prohibitionists are making a winning fight for the enforcement of the Volstead act, Representative Grant Hudson of Michigan told the 22nd national convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America today.

"Prohibition laws are more generally observed than formerly, convictions are increasing and jail sentences have been gaining in favor," Hudson said.

MORE ARRESTS MADE IN MUSSOLINI PLOT

ROME, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Two more arrests were made today in connection with the alleged plot to kill Premier Mussolini, Italian dictator.

General Giampietro and Guido Slataper, both holders of the Italian gold medal for their heroic services during the war, were taken into custody, and other arrests are expected from within the ranks of the anti-fascist organization, "Italian Liberia."

not seal them except when bearing a printed label or endorsement reading: "Contents: merchandise. Postmaster: This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary," together with name and address of sender, as sealed parcels not so labeled or endorsed are subject to postage at the letter rate.

Parcels may be marked "Do not open till Christmas" this being permitted to encourage early mailing.

Insure valuable parcels.

Do not enclose letters in parcels as doing so would subject entire parcel to letter postage.

Written greetings such as "Merry Christmas" "Happy New Year," "With best wishes," and names, numbers or symbols for the purpose of description may be inclosed with parcel post mail (third or fourth class). Books may bear dedicatory inscriptions not of personal nature. Other written additions subject parcels to letter postage. Communications prepaid at the first class rate may be sent with parcels prepaid at the third or fourth class rate by securely attaching the envelopes containing the letters on other written matter to the outside of the parcels.

Christmas seals or stickers should not be placed on the address side of mail.

OBITUARY
Amos Clinton Keller was born at New Castle, Penn., April 19, 1865 on the very day when the church bells were solemnly tolling for the funeral of Abraham Lincoln.

While yet a child the family removed to Hays, Kansas which then was the western terminus of the Union Pacific. From here they went by the way of stage coach to Denver, Colo.

In 1894 on the 3rd of October he was married to Fanny E. Sharp. In the state of Idaho he began his railroad career in 1887 which he followed for 37 years, retiring one year ago last October. He was a pioneer member of Trainmen in Pocatello, Idaho.

For some twenty-six years he has been a resident of this state. He united with the Baptist church of this city while our people were yet worshipping in the old building on Church and High Sts.

Mr. Keller had been in poor health for the last two years, the recent attack lasting for eight days, resulting in his death. Beside the widow there are three children and one granddaughter: Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Potter and daughter of Hill, Calif., Robert J. Keller, professor in the schools of Oakland, Calif.,

and Ivera Keller of Ashland. Also, one sister, Mrs. Lillie Campbell of Portland, Ore., and an uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. William E. Reed of Avery St., in this city.

So after 60 years, 6 months, and 14 days, came to its close a life spent in industry and in fidelity to family, country and

God. Those who knew him remember him as an affectionate husband and father, a generous and whole-hearted friend and neighbor.

Funeral services were held in the Dodge Undertaking Parlors, Pastor M. S. Woodworth officiating. The body was laid to rest in the Mountain View Cemetery.
