Ashland started the year with a bunch of light, inexperienced men, while Medford had a bunch of veterans back. Now, the Ashland youngsters are in the best shape of the season. They have won but one game, trouncing Roseburg 13-0, and tying Grants Pass, 7-7. Medford has swamped every opponent this season, and looks upon Ashland as easy meat.
Coach Hughes has made a few minor shifts in his lineup since the Roseburg game and figures his outfit the strongest at any time during the season.
Two University of Oregon and one O. A. C. men will officiate at the tussle. This decision came after several conferences between the two coaches. Medford authorities quoted Hughes as declaring he did not want valley men as officials suggested. It was then suggested that outside men be obtained, and Hughes agreed.

Husband were allowed to shoot again, secured a rifle and shot her husband through the fleshy part of the thigh. Rogers then ran to his cabin to get a gun to protect himself against further attacks from the crazed assailant.
The attack by his wife had an instant effect on Maguire. He stopped attacking the other men near the cabin, looked at his wife and remarked:
"It that's what you want, I'll

do it."
He then shot himself through the right eye. The first neighbor to be attracted by the shooting was John Eadert, living in a nearby cabin. When he reached the scene of the fray, Maguire was dead.
