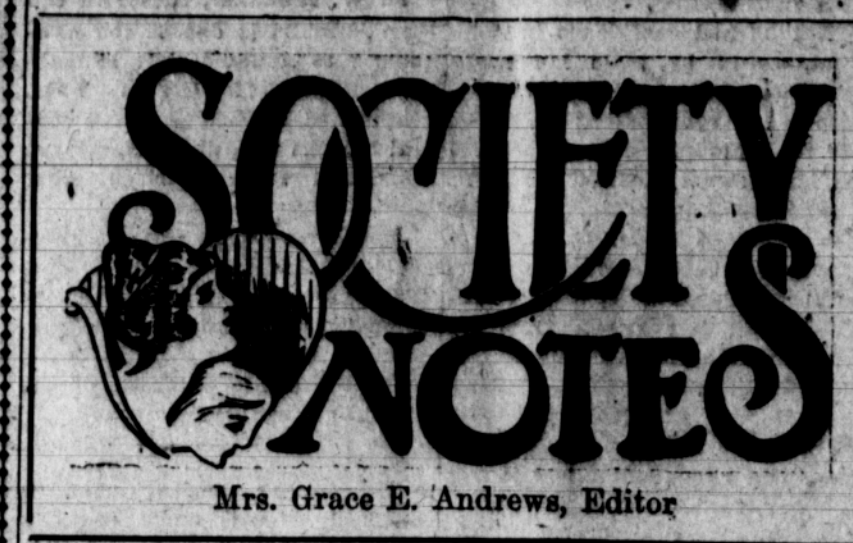

The meetings of this organization alternate between the different towns represented in its membership.

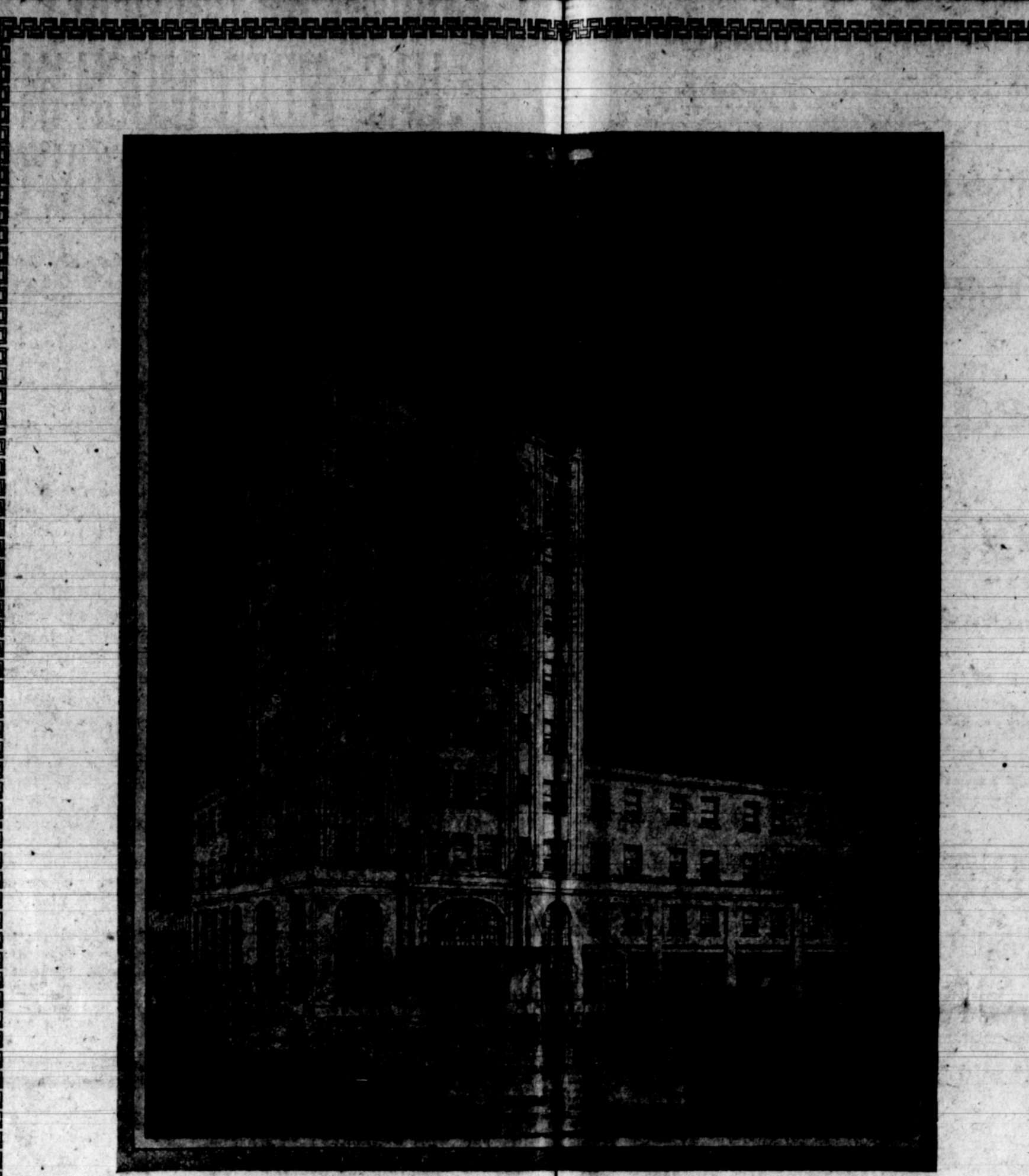

Poem By R. P. Campbell—The following little poem is published at the request of a number who wish to keep R. P. Campbell's memory alive. A poem read at the 50th anniversary of the Presbyterian church, Ashland, based on actual incidents, written by Richard Posey Campbell.

The Little Church in the Trees—In the far-off past when the land was new, and the hills were young, when work was plenty and hands were few, when the savage lurked in the forest deep and passions ruled and life was cheap, this church was founded—not built with hands, but with God's hands.

Fruit Produce Body Has Shown a Steady Growth During Past

Organized 23 years ago as a corporation, the Ashland Fruit and Produce association has enjoyed a steady growth since that time, handling the various crops of the many growers of this section. This handling and selling is done for a commission, ranging from three to ten per cent of the sale price.

The association makes it possible for growers to pool their products to fill a carload order, and receive the benefit of carload shipments. This is the most profitable way for the grower, the association and the community as a whole, according to Carl J. Brommer, manager of the association.

The volume of business to be handled this year, according to Brommer's report will be 50,000 dozen eggs, 50,000 tons of poultry feed, 20,000 tons of dairy feed, two tons of grain seed, 20,000 tons of white grass, 20,000 tons of ground and rolled grain, 25,000 tons of root crops, 5,000 dozen crates of berries, 15 tons of cherries, 100 tons of peaches, 40 tons of pears, 500 boxes of plums, 2,000 boxes of tomatoes, 20,000 boxes of apples, 1,500,000 berry

LOCAL LAUNDRY ONE OF BEST IN ALL STATE

Verolone Drying Tumbler, Most Modern Drying Apparatus Installed

The latest type of drying machinery manufactured for laundry use, the Verolone drying tumbler, was recently installed at the Ashland Laundry by Mr. Wright, proprietor of the establishment.

Mr. Wright is justly proud of his new equipment. The temperature in the tumbler never rises to more than 115 degrees, and there is absolutely no danger of scorched clothing or materials when dried in the Verolone.

During the past five years, much new equipment has been installed in the local laundry, included in this list is a 110 mesh flatwork ironer, a machine as large as those used in the largest plants.

So-called "form" for drying and freshening socks have also been installed. The boiler has been re-set, and the plant generally rearranged, making it one of the best small city laundries in the state.

During the year, about 20 persons find employment at the laundry, adding much to the payroll of the city.

JORDAN MILL HERE IS A NEW VENTURE

One of the new businesses in Ashland is the Jordan Flaming mill, started here in 1928 by Frank Jordan, for 25 years a building contractor of this city. Since the start, which was made with four small machines, the business of the concern has grown so rapidly that at present there are 15 machines in the shop.

All sorts of planing mill and saw and door work is done at the mill, and Mr. Jordan reports that his business is increasing rapidly and that the people of Ashland are supporting him wonderfully in his venture.

ASHLAND CREAMERY IS MOST MODERN

One of Ashland's finest plants is the Ashland Creamery, operated by J. W. Dewars.

New equipment has been installed in the plant during the past year, bringing it up to date, and making it possible to handle the finest of materials throughout the year.

Much of the butter, cream and cream cheese shipped out of the creamery is used by the Southern Pacific Dining car service.

WESTERN AUTO HAS NEW CONCRETE FLOOR

The Western Auto Supply company, one of the big automobile accessories companies of the country, opened a store in Ashland during the past year. This store brought added recognition to Ashland, since these stores are established in only the most promising cities.
