Roy Hughett Speaker at Evening Meeting of Body

Roy Hughett, professor in the social science department of the Oregon Agricultural College, will be the principal speaker at the chamber-of-commerce dinner, to be held Tuesday evening at the Lithia Springs Hotel. Hughett is one of the foremost authorities in the country in commercial law, and it is in this department that he does a great deal of his work at the Agricultural College, although he does a large amount of work in economics and sociology. He is a forceful speaker and has a pleasing personality, capable of obtaining a contact with his audiences quickly.
