RAY JILLSON SLAYS MRS. FRED NEIL; THEN COMMITS SUICIDE

timate with Jillson are at a loss to understand the tragedy, and all are unanimous in declaring that it must have come as the result of a sudden fit of insane rage, which Jillson's friends declare he was a victim of, on former occasions. His fellow employes at the Southern Pacific station declare that he has been morose and sulky for the past few days, but those who have met him at the Neil home declare he was in the best of spirits.

Jillson's body was discovered by Jean, eight year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Neil. Returning from school, shortly before four o'clock, she saw Jillson lying on the back porch. Notifying neighbors, she was still ignorant that her mother was lying nearby.

That the tragedy occurred shortly after one o'clock is shown by the dishes from the noon day meal in the sink, with water and soap in the dishpan, and a few dishes lying on a small drainboard.

Mrs. Neil had an engagement to sing at the Wednesday Club yesterday afternoon, and when she did not appear, her friends attempted to locate her. They were unable to reach the house by phone, and Fred Neil was called. He in turn called Charles Winnie, neighbors of the family, asking whether she latter had seen Mrs. Neil. Winnie walked over to the home, tried the door leading to the back porch, but was unable to open it. He inferred that Mrs. Neil had left, and so notified Mr. Neil.

Mrs. Winnie is the only person reporting having heard the shots. She declares that she heard what she thought were four or five raps in rapid succession, and Mrs. Neil crying. Since it has been Mrs. Neil's custom to rap loudly on Jillson's door to call him for meals, she paid little attention to the matter, and a few moments later, left for town.

Mrs. Neil was the daughter of a pioneer family of Southern Oregon. She spent her girlhood days in Klamath county, and her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. George Loosley are still residents of that section. Her brother, Kay Loosley, is a well known and prominent rancher of the Klamath Agency, where the family resided for several years. Another brother, Ed Loosley is a resident of Montague.

In addition to her brothers and father and mother, Mrs. Neil is survived by her husband, Fred Neil, two sons, Joseph, 18 and Kay Frederick, 16, and one daughter, Jean. She is a niece of Captain O. C. Applegate, pioneer of Southern Oregon.

Mr. and Mrs. George Loosley were preparing to visit their daughter and son-in-law here yesterday evening, all ignorant that the tragedy had occurred, when they received a wire telling them of the murder.

Jillson is survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Jillson of 105 Pioneer street, and one sister, Mrs. E. V. Carey, also of this city.

The bodies last night were taken to Stock's Undertaking Parlors by H. C. Stock, assistant coroner. County Coroner Conger was called last night, but up to late this afternoon it had not been decided whether an autopsy would be held.

Funeral announcements will be made later, members of both families stated.

LIFE OF BLAZER HAS BEEN ONE OF SELF SACRIFICE

bathe, dress and care for Hazel when the girl had attained her full growth to about 90 pounds. She had to have specially prepared, pre-digested food. Her only amusement was rattling a piece of paper.

In 1899 Dr. Blazer gave up his regular practice and in 1919 moved to Colorado. He settled in Walsenburg, Colo., and became physician for the Colorado Fuel and Iron company. The years went by peacefully until in 1924, Mrs. Blazer died.

Blazer and his invalid daughter moved here in November of that year to the home of his daughter and son-in-law, Roy Bishop.

On March 24, of this year, the Blazers left for the day. They returned at 6 o'clock in the evening and found Hazel dead from chloroform and the physician slashed across the throat with a razor.

Two notes, evidently written to Mrs. Bishop, were discovered. One of them read: "I am weary and afraid—afraid of being taken suddenly and leaving Hazel. I know my blood pressure is very high. I made up my mind a great number of years ago I would not leave her behind." "She is a burden, notwithstanding our love for her. With great love - - - Dad."

ciologists, psychologists and clerics commented upon the burning issue: "Is it ever right to take a human life?"

Shortly after noon of November 6, the jury of 13 men was completed. The 13th juror was an alternate to take the place of any juror who might become ill.

During the progress of the trial Prosecutor Stone made a bitter newspaper attack upon Blazer and upon those whose "maudlin sympathy" was being injected into the case. Lewis De R. Mowry, chief defense counsel, countered with similar heated charges.

The state introduced evidence designed to prove that the imbecile daughter "suffered the same torments, the same agony, the same pain, mental and physical, as any other normal person when poison was administered."

The most dramatic point in the building up of the state's case was reached when Mrs. Bishop, her frame wracked by sobs, took the stand and recited the events subsequent to the coming of her sister and father to her husband's home.

It was a gripping ordeal of family life concerning the creature who frightened strangers away but who was carried about, fed like a baby and nursed lovingly through many violent illnesses.

Mowry, in his opening statement for the defense, said that the doctor "did the right thing and the moral thing for the daughter whom he had cared for 34 years to save her from becoming a charge of others when he felt his own end was near."

The high mark in the defense the climax of the entire trial, was reached when the aged doctor, wrinkled and whitehaired, testified in his own defense.

The doctor's formal plea had been insanity. It was a tense court room that heard counsel lead up to the direct question: "Do you remember giving Hazel poison and slashing your

own throat?"

A woman's sob was all that disturbed the silence of the chamber until the doctor answered in measured tones: "I don't remember."

Another such moment occurred when, in trying to shake his direct testimony, Prosecutor Stone thundered: "Were you sane or insane on February 24?"

"I don't know," and as if abashed, the aged man dropped his head.
