**NYE APPOINTED**  
BISMARCK, N. D., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Appointment of Gerald Nye, of Cooperstown, N. D., and a newspaper publisher, to fill the vacancy in the United States Senate caused by the death of Senator Edwin A. Ladd was announced today by Governor Sorlie. The appointment holds until a special election next June. Nye is a non-partisan.

**DAMASCUS NORMAL**  
PARIS, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Damascus was reported normal and out of danger of attack from guerrilla bands in messages to the foreign office today. The uprising against French rule in Damascus is reported effectively curbed.

**EVACUATION WILL**  
START DECEMBER 1  
PARIS, Nov. 14.—(AP)—The Council of Ambassadors today decided to start the evacuation of Cologne on December 1.

This move is the first fruit of the Locarno peace pacts, and follows Germany's agreement to the final demands of the Allies.

Germany has long sought the evacuation of the Rhine cities by Allied troops, and today's announcement, it is said, will mean the collapse of any organized opposition to the Locarno pacts at Berlin.

Elmer Morse, 13, testified that on the night of the slaying, "the dogs had barked" and kept him
