Turkies Are High, Trimmings Lower, Than Last Year

With Thanksgiving Day but one day away, the housewife is turning her thoughts to the edibles which must be ordered from the grocer for this ever eventful day, when good things to eat mean much.

A survey of the markets today disclosed the fact that the Thanksgiving bird, turkey, is slightly higher than the market price of last year, as is the case with geese, chicken and ducks. At the grocery stores where the housewife goes to purchase the trimmings, such as mince meat, cranberries, celery, lettuce, pumpkin, squash, sweet potatoes, peppers beets, carrots, bananas, apples and oranges, she finds each article slightly cheaper than the price she pa'd a year ago, which will more than balance the raise in price on the turkey or whatever fowl might be chosen for the main course of the Thanksgiving meal.

NEW KLAMATH RIVER BRIDGE SAID SAFE

SACRAMENTO, November 25 -Almost everyone around the state offices has something to be thankful for. This year, bridge engineers of the California Highway Commission are most thankful for the fact that the Douglas Memorial bridge in Del Norte County is safe. A year ago. floods in the Klamath River caused considerable delay when one of the plers of the great concrete structure, still in course of construction, was washed out.
