however, that the experiment was too dangerous and would be likely to bring further depreciation of the franc, disorganization of the country's finances and further tangling of the political situation. He gave preference to the idea of a concentration cabinet and called M. Briand again after consulting with the radical leaders as to the possibility of rallying the radicals to a union of parties that would eliminate the socialist influence.

value of the said lands from the tax rolls of Jackson County, and WHEREAS the assessed value of the said lands, in 1916, being approximately \$4,000,000 their said removal from the tax rolls entailed a loss to the County in tax revenue, for the years succeeding, in the approximate sum of \$84,000 per year, and WHEREAS the sum of \$84,000, in addition to all other tax revenues available was required to defray the cost of administration of County affairs and also to pay the portion of State taxes apportioned to Jackson County, and

WHEREAS these conditions laid upon the taxpayers of Jackson county an added burden of tax and increased by 16 per cent to 18 per cent the public levies upon their properties for State and County purposes, and

WHEREAS these excessive levies by reason of the conditions set out herein, have in many cases proved confiscatory to the extent that they are contributory to a speedy and sure absorption of the equity of the taxpayer on the property assessed, and WHEREAS these conditions are such as to render the necessity of an appeal for immediate relief imperative, and WHEREAS in view of all the facts, conditions and considerations herein noted, an undertaking has been initiated, to enlist the co-operation of all other counties of the State affected in like manner, in an effort to secure an adjustment of the tax revenues so lost to the Counties by virtue of the aforesaid Federal action, through appropriation of Federal funds for the purpose to be paid directly to the Counties in proportion to the tax revenues of which the several Counties were deprived through the Federal action first above described, and

WHEREAS, precedent is not lacking for the appropriation of Federal funds for this purpose in that Congress has given some recognition to our claim by an appropriation of \$240,000 which sum was paid to Jackson County to reimburse the treasury of Jackson County for taxes already levied for the years 1913, 1914, 1915, upon the lands above referred to, but not collected by Jackson County.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, this 26th day of November, A. D., 1925:

That we heartily commend and endorse the undertaking initiated as indicated and pledge our active cooperation and support in the effort to accomplish the objects herein set forth, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we proceed at once to obtain the cooperation of the County Courts in all Counties of Oregon, affected as Jackson County has been affected in this matter, in a concerted effort to attain the purpose declared herein; namely, to secure reimbursement for the tax revenues of which the Counties have been deprived in the manner hereinabove recited.
