## SALEM LINEN MILL OPEN NEXT JULY

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 11.—(UP)—Directors of Salem's proposed new linen mill expect to have the plant in operation by July 1 of next year, it is announced here.  
 The plant is planned to cost \$640,000, and will employ about 150 men when in full operation. Flax growing has been increasing steadily in the Willamette Valley, until investors have been convinced that a mill could be operated on a paying basis.  
 Flax growing first was fostered by the state, with convict labor as an experiment, but the flax had to be sold to mills abroad.  
 The experiments proved, though that flax raising was profitable in western Oregon, and the linen mill was the next step.

# RECLAMATION CONFERENCE OPENS TODAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—(UP)—Secretary of Interior Work today opened the national reclamation conference here, which devoted its first session to problems of developing arid lands in the west and settling deserted farm lands of the east.  
 Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, several senators and congressmen and representatives will present different aspects of the agrarian problem to the conference.

"This conference is called to devise means for making rural life more attractive and to broaden the opportunities for settlement and farm development by people of small or moderate means," Elwood Mead, commissioner of the bureau of reclamation said.  
 "Its purpose is also to discuss the recent law enacted by Congress authorizing the appropriation of \$100,000 to investigate the possibilities of reclaiming swamp and cut-over timber lands.  
 On present federal reclamation projects about 500,000 acres of land are unirrigated, uncultivated and largely unsettled, according to data presented to the conference.  
 "The settlement of these lands will not only contribute to the economic and social value of the reclamation policy, but is the thing needed to improve its revenues," according to Mead.  
 "This situation comes from the past depression in agriculture, the high wages in industry, and the resulting movement away from the country rather than toward it."

BIRMINGHAM Ala., Dec. 11.—(U. P.)—With estimates of the deaths running as high as sixty, rescue crews went into the depths of the Overton mine No. 2 today, in their search for additional bodies of miners killed in the gas explosion of yesterday. This morning, bodies of seven whites and 43 negroes had been recovered. Officials of the company believed that two whites and a number of negroes remained below.

 This was revealed by the district attorney's office here today. It was said that one of the suspects attempted to dispose of bonds to Etheridge, which were stolen from the bank.  
 The suspects are Vincent Murphy, George Griffin, George Welch, James Murray and Wallace Witsel. The latter three have prison records.

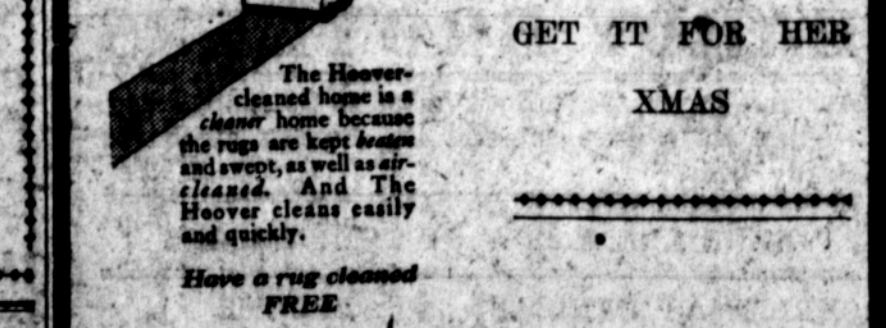
