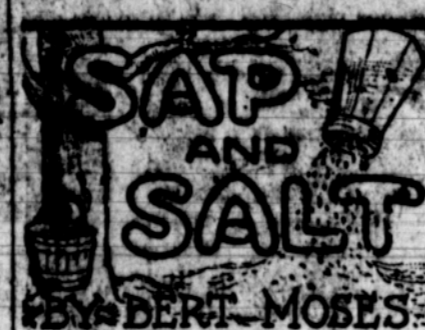
REGRET
