TO REBUILD EASTERN FARMS

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine the other day indulged in some observations on farm rehabilitation that might seem like an attack on the Far West. His words should rather be respected as a far sighted effect to maintain the agricultural balance of the whole country.

Mr. Jardine declared for a rebuilding of the farming areas of the East that have been destroyed by wasteful methods of tillage.

These farms were worn out in the days when farm land was cheap, and moving was easy, and Americans knew little about keeping up the soil.

During the last 40 years, great areas of New England and other eastern states became depopulated because men and women could not afford to live on them. There was too much better land in the West.

Today that time is past. There is no longer any "easy tillage" land to be had; and the Government has been experimenting for 20 years in reclamation systems, to furnish more land. Some of this reclamation has been successful. Some has been badly managed.

There has been serious question as to whether it is worth while to build up any more highly capitalized farm areas in the West, as long as it is possible for self sustaining farm sections to be encouraged in the East. The costly reclamation districts can not "live on the soil". They can only be maintained by the shipment of great amounts of goods East. The West has not learned, and so far has refused to learn, crop diversity. The East can live with little outside help. The West must have great outside markets.

The more the American Government can do to induce every portion of its territory to be self supporting, in foodstuffs, the more stable will industry be.

The more the West encourages industry, the more the East produces its own food, the better for the American people.

And incidentally, if the work of the national Government, in rebuilding the impoverished farm lands of the East, awakens the West as well to the need of keeping their acres fertile, it will be the better for the West.

NYE AND LA FOLLETTE

The effort that has been made to view the expected decision over the seating of Nye from North Dakota in the Senate as a Standpat Progressive issue has failed almost before it started. The question about Nye is a purely legal one. There appears to be no warrant under either the federal law or the law of North Dakota for the governor to make the appointment. And so Nye is not legally "senator." In this opinion, radical as well as conservative members of the Senate agree.

If, in fact, it was desired by the "Regulars" in the Senate to discipline any one, the obvious place to do it would have been in the case of young La Follette. But La Follette, even though he is a Republican for purposes of factional controversy only, is allowed his claim to party position and is given committee assignments. No one supposes that La Follette will cooperate in the putting through of Senate business, or that he will function as a Republican member. But the Senate managers have decided to be canny and give him more than he is entitled to.
