not more than six or eight feet apart, to provide the future forest. This thinning of trees which, if left, nature herself would deprive of life, yields it is true, slightly unsymmetrical Christmas trees, but the kind that should be demanded.—They usually fit well in a corner, anyway. Trees may also be cut from land which is to be cleared for farming.

Christmas tree vandalism should not be tolerated. Let every club take a stand against the common practice, even among decent citizens, of stealing trees along highways; cutting five or six to find one perfect one; cutting the tops out of large growing trees; or cutting thrifty young seedlings in open stands on good forest land.

More important than the whole Christmas tree problem, however, is the prevention of forest fires, particularly in young growth. Millions of Christmas trees are burned each year by the thoughtless and ignorant, while seeking summer pleasure. Most forest fires are man-caused, and one neglected, smoldering spark may destroy enough Christmas trees for every child in America. Help make our people forest-wise and fire-conscious and the Christmas tree problem will take care of itself.
