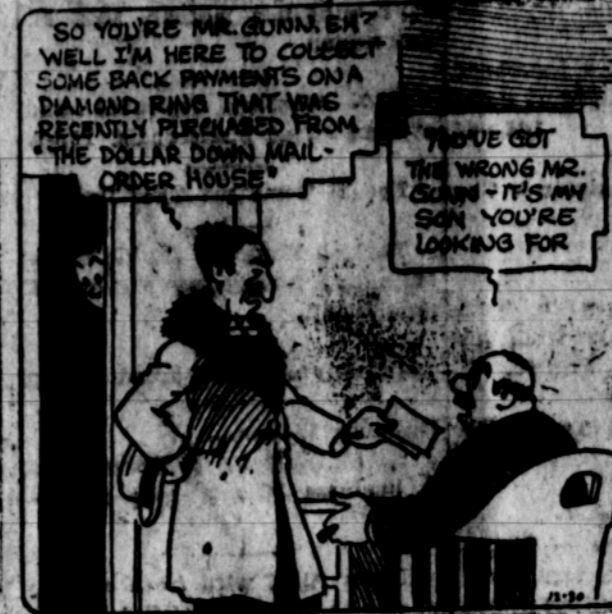

MCEWAN MAKES GREAT MARK AS ARMY MENTOR

of the United States Military Academy, West Point, indicates that he is one of the leading gridiron mentors of the country. In three years, the Army team, under McEwan, has defeated the Navy twice and tied them once. In addition McEwan's team defeated Notre Dame this year 27 to 0. Captain McEwan will sign a five-year contract at the University, according to an announcement by the executive council. He is to resign from the army immediately, and assume his duties shortly afterwards in Eugene. He will be a full-time coach, with the privilege of selecting his own assistant coaches. The election of McEwan came after a nation-wide search for a coach. Both Jack Benefiel, graduate manager, and Virgil Earl, athletic director, have spent some time in the East looking for the most outstanding prospect, and they selected McEwan as the best man. McEwan has been head coach at West Point since 1923, before which he was assistant to Major Daly for four years. In 1911 he played under Coach Williams at the University of Minnesota. For three years, 1912-13-14, he played on the Army team. From 1915 until 1916 he was in active service in the Army. He was on Camp's All-American team in 1914. In addition to his coaching work, Captain McEwan is a member of the national football rules committee. "I am sure that Captain Mc-

Ewan will have the full support of the University and the state. He is a football expert, and his work at Oregon should bring prestige to the state," Earl said.

ONWARD MARCH OF BUILDING CAUSES CHANGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5. (U. P.)—The onward march of progress soon will claim another historic landmark of San Francisco, for, within three months, the Parrott building at Montgomery and California

streets, will give way to a skyscraper, one that will cost two million dollars. Traditions of 75 years are woven in the Parrott building, erected in 1851 by Chinese laborers who were paid \$1 per day and board, and a day was from sun-up until sun-down. But the quaint three-story building, even though it took months to erect it, has been deemed too small to be consistent with land values in that neighborhood.

The building is a veteran of the "six great fires" of the fifties and sixties, and withstood the disaster if 1906, when its stone walls stood, although the interior was gutted by flames. These stone blocks, with

which the walls were built, were imported by Chinese builders from the orient, being brought here by vessels of the American clipper fleet.

Throughout the years the building has stood as a reminder of the service rendered to San Francisco by John Parrott, one of the state's early settlers, and founder of a fortune still in the hands of the family.

Old-timers regret the passing of one of the few remaining relics of the "city that was" but progress knows no sentiment and in modern cities skyscrapers are more important than buildings with a past.

The Advertiser is unfair to himself when he habitually sends his advertisements to the newspaper office just before the dead line.
