## OREGON FROSH HOOP SQUAD SHOWS PROMISE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 8.—(Special)—The stock of the University of Oregon freshmen basketball team took a decided jump upward when it was announced by Spike Leslie, coach, that Claire Scallon, Franklin high school athlete, turned out in a suit. Scallon won a place on the All-American high school all-star team at the national elimination tournament at Chicago last March in which the Franklin high placed third in the consolation tourney. For four years he was All-Portland high school forward and is considered the best basketball player ever developed in the Portland high schools. Scallon registered in pre-law. A teammate at Franklin, also a former Portland high all-star, Dave Epps, is now turning out for freshmen basketball.

Scallon, Epps, Tep Pope and Foster, all students of Oregon, played on the Franklin team which won the Portland high school league championship a couple of years ago. As the system taught by Billy Reinhart, head basketball coach at Oregon and that taught by Colton Meek, Franklin coach, and former Oregon student, is almost identical, Coach Leslie does not think the Portland boys will have much difficulty getting themselves adapted to Reinhart's methods. The freshmen material is the best in years, Leslie thinks. There are five ex-all state players trying out for positions, besides several Portland high school

and sectional all-stars. There are so many luminaries, in fact, that Coach Leslie has not yet selected the team he will take to Portland with him to play Franklin high tonight and Jefferson high Saturday night.

Among the outstanding players are: Scallon, Marvin Chaatin, of Medford; Keith Emmons, of Eugene; Bernard Hummel, of La Grande; and Gordon Riddings, of Eugene, forwards; Epps and Robert M. Greene, McMinnville, centers; and Joe Bally, Scott Milligan, and Don McCormick, all three of Eugene, guards.

Chaatin, Scallon, Riddings, Milligan, Hummel and Epps are players who have made either the first or second all-state teams within the last couple of years.
