WOULD REPLACE ILL. FATED DIRIGIBLE
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A bill, authorizing the appropriation of \$5,000,000 to replace the dirigible Shenandoah, was introduced into the House today by Representative Butler, Republican of Pennsylvania, chairman of the naval affairs committee. Butler said the bill was introduced to get the aircraft question before Congress. He also stated that hearings on aviation legislation would be started by his committee "in the near future." President Coolidge favors the replacement of the Shenandoah.

Ten suggestions for the guidance of aspiring persons are set forth in the Thrift Committee's "success creed." These are: work and earn, make a budget, record all expenditures, keep a bank account, carry life insurance, own your own home, make a will, invest in safe securities, pay bills promptly, and share with others. All of these points will be stressed during Thrift Week.

Each day during the week is set aside for specific attention to a given phase of thrift. Sunday, for example, will be "Share With Others Day," when the old adage, "It is more blessed to give than to receive," will be emphasized in churches all over the country. Systematic giving, conducted on business principles, is regarded as one of the main requirements of real thrift.

Monday, January 18, will be "Thrift Day," Tuesday, "Budget or Home Economy Day," Wednesday, "Insurance Day," Thursday, "Own Your Home Day," Friday, "Safe Investment Day," and Saturday "Pay Bills Promptly Day," at which time people will be urged to settle up all unpaid accounts and start the year afresh.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION UPHOLD BY RULING

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The Oregon state highway commission has the power to limit loads which may be carried by automobile trucks over the highways of the state, it was held today in the United States court, by Judges Wolverton, Bean and Gilbert.

The decisions in the case was to test the authority of the commission order decreasing the limit on trucks traveling between the Multnomah county line and Hood River, on the Columbia River highway, from 22 tons to 16,500 pounds.

AGAIN ATTEMPT TO RECALL COUNCILMEN
BEND, Jan. 11.—For the second time in two months recall petitions were placed in circulation here Friday by the Taxpayers' league, seeking the retirement of Mayor R. H. Fox and Councilmen C. V. Sylvia, A. O. Schilling, Oscar Carlson, K. B. Wall, C. P. Niswonger and O. C. Henkle.

Against each the recall petition charges extravagance, inefficiency, weakness in law enforcement, and unbusinesslike methods in handling the local water question.

The charges are substantially the same as those appearing on the previous petition, but are much milder in their wording. Councilmen and mayor have threatened to bring suit for criminal libel against the signers of the petition.

PIERCE OPPOSED TO PROSPECTIVE I. O. C.

SALEM, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The appointment of Richard V. Taylor of Alabama and Thomas W. Woodlock of New York to the Interstate Commerce Commission, is opposed by Governor Pierce as "bad public policy" in a telegram sent to Senators McNary and Stanfield. "The present cost of transportation is oppressive, and an increase in rates, which might result from the placing of the regulatory powers in the hands of railroad men, would be highly injurious to Oregon," Pierce said in his wire.
