ment and codification of international law, as soon as any subject is considered sufficiently ripe an international conference is summoned and an international treaty launched on the subject. To date the league has launched nearly a score of such treaties covering white slave traffic, opium traffic, obscene literature, customs formalities, international regime in maritime ports, etc., etc., while the International Labor Bureau has prepared regulating labor conditions. All of these, subject to the interpretation and enforcement by the League's Permanent Court of International Justice at the Hague constitute the foundation of the new code on international law which is being gradually built up by the League.
