

WINTER MAKES RUM RUNNING STILL EASIER

PORT HURON, Mich., Jan. 15. —(UP)—Winter has eliminated most of the hazards of Michigan-Ontario rum runners operating along the St. Clair and Detroit rivers and authorities admit that they have no way of effectively combating the smugglers until spring.

"Holiday liquor" brought in to supply thirsty Detroit and other large cities in the middle west was available here in unlimited quantities at reasonable prices. In spite of large seizures by state police and cooperating customs officers, Alan Straight, commissioner of public safety admits the hundreds of cases of whiskey confiscated represents "only a small portion" of the liquor which left the Canadian shore for the United States during the last month.

It is virtually impossible to patrol the international boundary by water between here and Toledo after December cold sets in in earnest. Men cannot spend hours cruising in open boats and shore ice is troublesome.

The comparatively short time required to cross to the American shore makes it possible, however, for the liquor smuggler to run his cargo to some abandoned dock along the hundred mile shore line. Trucks are waiting for the boats and the liquor is moved to retailers under cover of darkness without particular danger unless land officers are "tipped" of the arrival of the shipments.

About forty state troopers and federal land agents patrol the shore between Port Huron and Monroe at the present time and Straight believes it would take at least 100 men to deter the smugglers to any extent. Three state police posts are maintained at intervals along the border and a flying squadron operates along the line following up special information of smuggling attempts.

In spite of Straight's statement that the border patrol was virtually ineffective in combating rum runners during the winter, report of the state police department for 1925 shows almost 50,000 quarts of whiskey and more than 1,500,000 bottles of beer were seized.

SCOUT MANUAL WOULD BE BOOK OF U. O. PROF.

(Editor: This is the sixth of a series of interviews with members of the University of Oregon faculty who thoroughly conversant with literature. Each professor was asked what 12 books he would select if he were shipwrecked and had enough time to choose the volumes from a complete ship's library.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 15. (Special) "If I were cast away on a desert island and had a chance to select twelve volumes from a complete library," said Walter Snyder, assistant professor of English at the University of Oregon. "I would look at the situation from a practical standpoint.

"First, I would select a 'Boy Scout Manual.' This would contain much of the needed information, and practical knowledge on how to live in such a place.

"Next, I would take a dictionary; it would be the nearest thing to a complete encyclopedia in one volume. One could get all sorts of ideas from it, and the illustrations in the volume would help a great deal in a place like a desert island.

"For the third book I would select a good book on botany. I might want to grow something on the island and would want to distinguish the poisonous plants from the non-poisonous.

"A good book on birds would be my next choice. I could find a great deal of amusement in studying the little creatures and this avocation would help to occupy a lot of my time.

"Now, how many does that make?"

"Four," said the reporter, "you have time to grab eight."

"No, I wouldn't have a novel. I would prefer something I would read over several times and enjoy it at each reading.

"I think for my last book I would take a book on drawing. On a desert island a person would have all kinds of opportunity to practice sketching.

"That list ought to keep me busy for awhile but if I were going to be there all my life, I

would try and salvage a few more volumes from the lost ship."

TO REGULATE PHILIPPINE FLAGGELANTES

BY WILLIAM KUHN United Press Staff Correspondent MANILA, Jan. 15.—(UP)—The annual orgy of self-punishment indulged in by the Flaggelantes or fanatical adherents of an ancient Filipino religious rite, will be strictly regulated henceforth by officials of the Philippine Government. This order has been issued as a timely warning to prevent excesses which have marred this extraordinary ritual heretofore.

The origin of the whippers is traced in the remote past. Some time in the early part of each year, usually about Good Friday, repentant sinners assemble in certain localities which have served as centers as the scenes of some strange ceremonies. The flaggelantes spot is just outside the city because of the fact that thousands of spectators are attracted.

Armed with knotted hand-whips and stripped of all clothing except loin cloths, the Flaggelantes first work themselves
