JANUARY WAS NAMED IN HONOR ROMAN GOD

January, the opening month of the year was named in honor of the Roman god, Janus, whose name, in turn, was derived from the Latin word—Janua,—meaning door or opening. The doors of his temple in the Forum faced East and West and Janus is shown facing two ways to represent the beginning and ending of day. There were three windows and a door on each side of the building, making twelve windows and four doors in all, which represented the twelve months and four seasons of the year.
