Gentlemen:

With the acceptance of the resignation of Mr. Brommer as manager of your association, you are again faced with the problem of securing a man who is capable of putting the selling organization upon a paying basis.

Any man who takes up the managerial reins of an organization, operating on an eight per cent basis, without signed contracts with the growers, insuring all their fruit, is up against a tough proposition. He must work from day to day, from hand to mouth, in marketing the products of his growers, never knowing from day to day how much he will be called upon to sell.

It is the history of almost every cooperative marketing body, that they have started by attempting to market products without contracts with the growers. And it has been the inevitable, that they were finally forced to request contracts.

Without a contract a grower leaves the organization as THE association; with a contract as MY association. Without a contract, he has little or no interest in the association, except the money he will receive for his products, while with a contract, he knows he must keep the association on a paying basis, or in the years to come he will be minus his selling organization.

Hoping you have success with your new manager, and that he receives the undivided support of the growers, I am,
