STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — Congress is now developing in Congress over the appropriation of money for new federal buildings, here, there and everywhere throughout the land, that it seems quite likely none will be appropriated at all.

Government buildings class as "perk" among congressmen. There are other kinds of "perk" too, like river and harbor improvements, but government buildings are a mighty perk kind.

Congressmen are very fond of "perk" and as little as it has been served out in an hour a time that everybody's belly is starving for some.

The government hasn't been doing any building to speak of, or even repairing, since America went into the war, and a certain amount of this sort of work really is needed, as the president himself admits.

The president wanted to spend just as little as possible and thought he'd figured out a way to head the congressmen off.

His plan was to have Congress appropriate 150 million dollars and leave it to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and Postmaster General Nease to spend as they deem best, their departments being the ones most of the new buildings are needed for.

Congress instantly let out a loud howl, and as soon as it convened its members lost no time in introducing a few more than 700 bills for individual public buildings in their various districts, which was pretty good considering that there are only 531 congressmen, counting senators and representatives both. One building apiece wasn't enough for some.

And whereas the president's estimate was 150 millions, Congress' bills call for approximately 350.
