### Tarry Meeting is Described by O. F. Carson

Asked if he had been present when St. Paul was voted into the church, Carson described it as a "monologue" and he did not accept it as binding on the congregation to the "Four-Square Gospel."

"I had no objection to St. Paul," he said. "I voted for St. Paul then, and I would vote for him again."

Asked to describe the "speaking in tongues" at "tarry meetings," Carson said it started by kneeling in prayer and repeating over and over the sacred name, followed by the supplicant trembling, rolling back of the eyes and collapsing and uttering unintelligible noises. Some, the witness declared, would be unconscious for varying periods up to an hour, and that he had also seen those under the "influence" employ pantomime. In response to a question he said he never heard anyone "bark like a dog, or crow like a rooster."

Carson testified also that when a "tarry meeting" was in progress people were lying about the floor and "you had to be careful not to step on somebody." Pillows and blankets, he said, were furnished for the prostrate and that the ventilation was so "poor I couldn't stand it very long. He had always left the meetings about midnight, he asserted.

Under cross-examination Carson was questioned and said that the Baptist faith was founded upon the Holy Bible, and that interpretations of the word was a matter for the individual conscience.

Rev. B. C. Miller, pastor of the First Baptist church of Ashland, Inc., will be the first witness to be called to the stand this morning when court convenes. Miller admitted teaching faith healing, and was only called to the stand by the attorneys for the plaintiffs in order that he might make this admission, and thereby save several days of proof, which otherwise would have been necessary.

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Charges of attempted jury fixing in the sensational trial of Roy Olmstead in the booze conspiracy case, in which 91 persons have been indicted, were being investigated here as the case proceeded in court today.

An aged man, apparently about 70, was found last night lying in the middle of the Boulevard in the Bellview district, by passing motorists. When first found, it was believed that he had been struck by an automobile, but later investigation disclosed that he was suffering from a slight paralytic attack. Relatives of the man were finally located by the police, and he was taken to his home, where this morning it was reported he was improving rapidly.

### CONTRACTS GIVEN ON OREGON STATE ROADS

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Contracts awarded by the State Highway Commission today included: ten miles of Roosevelt Highway in Clatsop county, to the Motor Investment company for \$63,916; seven miles of Redwood Highway in Josephine county to the E. L. McNutt Co., for \$69,325; the Bowers Slough bridge in Benton county to John W. Ash, for \$9,782; culverts on the Redwood Highway in Josephine county, to A. G. Enright, for \$19,179. Hearing on the application for a bridge from Ranier to Longview, over the Columbia river, are to be held this afternoon.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Sherman Cooley, 65, commissioner of the eastern half of Klickitat county, Washington, died early today of heart trouble in a taxicab here.

### FILIBUSTERERS ARE WINNERS OF FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Administration leaders made overtures of peace to the Senate filibusterers against the World Court late today. The irreconcilables were informed by acting Republican floor leaders, privately, that they would agree to setting aside the World Court, taking up the tax bill if the insurgents would agree to a date in the near future for a vote on the World Court bill. The Senate will be adjourned earlier than usual today to permit the filibusterers to meet and decide upon the date, if they can.

### 25 PLANES WILL FLY TO ISLAND

NORFOLK, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Twenty five navy seaplanes left the Hampton Roads base on a flight to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, today, where they will join the scouting fleet at its winter base. The first step was to Charleston, where the squadron will refuel.

### TRAINS CRASH ON FLORIDA-COAST LINE

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—A crowded south-bound tourist train on the Florida-East Coast line, collided head on with a freight train near Bayard, thirty miles south of here today. There were many shakeups, but no one was reported killed, and only a few seriously injured.
