The Holy Writ describes the "out-cost apostle" as "speaking in tongues," and a healer. The witness asserted that the unanimous vote of the congregation was an endorsement of the teachings of Paul, not the "Almee McPherson Four-Square Gospel New Movement."

The conduct of the "Tarry meetings," stressed by the plaintiff witnesses as "non-Baptistic," the pastor said were always conducted in a "reverent atmosphere."

"A striking incident," Rev. Miller testified, "was the case of two men who attended a 'Tarry meeting,' and viewed it rather lightly. I thought. Two women stood behind their chairs and prayed. One man fell from his chair as if he had been hit with a hammer. The other attempted to depart, and was stricken." Both, the witness said, later became adherents of the faith.

no law or equity on their side of the case. Be that as it may, that is the way I felt and our people felt when we made them the proposition which terminated the case.

"Feeling that no matter how righteous our cause might be the case ought not to go on. On Tuesday at noon, I called six of the men belonging to the church to which I minister, aside and when I told them, how I felt about it, I was gratified to learn that without hesitation, they said 'It is all right with us, we could never worship in the building again feeling as we do about it.' I returned home that evening and found quite a number of our people engaged in a prayer meeting. When the matter was put to them they answered unanimously, and without hesitation, practically the same. I felt then that it would be wrong to con-

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tinue the suit. If we waited till after the suit was won to give the property to them, it could scarcely have been given or received in a Christian spirit. It could have at that time, and believe and trust, that it was.

"I will say that I did this under the most strenuous objections of our attorneys. They both felt that we were acting very foolishly, and from their standpoint I think we were. They had been so conscientious and had worked so hard on the case, that it was a sore trial to go against their insistency, for I respect and appreciate them very much. But I felt there was a higher authority to please than they. I made no stipulation in the matter of surrender of the property and name to the other side, but did ask that they right in a measure the wrong that had been done us in their complaint and so often in the local paper, derogatory to our character and conduct. This matter, however was left to their own discretion, it was not a part of our stipulation.

"I will say that we intend to go on. That goes without saying. A people that has gone through so much as ours have, are not the kind that turn back easily. Indeed we never felt more like going on than now. We will build in the near future. What name we will assume, I do not know. It might be the St. Paul Baptist Church of Ashland, as we are strict adherents of his theology.

"We wish to thank our friends who have stood by us, and invite them to the Bungalow where for a while we will continue our services.

"We trust that all animosities will be buried, and forever forgotten. We have nothing but good wishes for our friends, the late enemy."

William Pracht Tells of Early Life in Alaska

(Continued From Page One)

peaches won first prize at the World's fair and also at Buffalo, at the Lewis and Clark, at the Alaska-Yukon at Seattle, and at many other expositions. While father ran the Oregon hotel here I worked on the peach orchard. Later father worked as special agent for the United States land office, continuing till 1915.

"I joined the Oregon National Guard in 1897. At the breaking out of the Spanish - American war our company and the company at Roseburg were merged as company B of the First Oregon, and

we served through the Spanish-American war and also the Filipino insurrection, under Captain John L. May, who during the World war was in command of the 162d Infantry — the Oregon regiment. I knew that the United States must get into the war, so I enlisted in the naval coast defense reserve prior to our entrance. I was the first to enlist. I was not called into active service till December 13, 1917. I reported at Bremerton and was assigned to service aboard the Comet. When the Comet was put out of commission I was assigned to the Western Plain Hull No. 3,

of 3500 tons. We left Portland in October 1918. We were passing through the Panama canal when we received word of the armistice. We arrived at Gibraltar December 19, and from there we went to Gallipoli, Constantinople, Smyrna, Malta, Cyprus and elsewhere. I was not discharged until March, 1921. I enlisted as a seaman first class and was discharged as engineman first class, drawing \$58 a month. I am now a member of the naval reserve. My feet are beginning to itch, so I am planning to go to Alaska to get into the mining game again." —Portland Journal.
