Names of Days of Week Have Ancient Origin

Monday received its name from the moon and was formerly called "Moon Day."

Like the sun, it was worshipped everywhere and was supposed to be a woman, as its pale feeble beams did not benefit mankind like the strong rays of the sun.

Tuesday was formerly "Tiu's Day," named after Tiu, the powerful war god, worshipped

by the Angles and Saxons in ancient days.

Wednesday derived its name from the moon and was of the gods of our ancestors. He was supposed to have conquered the giants of frost and ice and made the land of the Norsemen habitable.

Thursday, the fifth day of our week, was named by the Northmen, in honor of their god Thor, the Thunderer. He was usually drawn in a chariot of brass and this was supposed to make the thunder as it tore across the heavens.

Friday was named after Freya, the Norse goddess of love and beauty. She was thus honored as it was believed that the gloom of the long Northern night was dispelled by her sword, whose flashing gave forth the beams of light, heralding the approach of day.

Saturday, the last day of our week, derived its name from Saturn, the Roman god of seeds and sowing. In his honor, the Romans held a great winter feast, the Saturnalia, to show their gratitude for the bountiful crops he gave them.

NEW RUDDER OUT TO ACT AS BRAKE

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 22—(U.P.)—A new style of power boat rudder, that acts as a brake and a maneuvering apparatus as well as a steering device has been invented and patented here by a Swedish engineer, J. E. Rylander.

It consists of two blades that can be set at an angle with the opening forward so that the water current is thrown back against the propeller, which stops the boat at once, even though the engine keeps going.

GYPSEY ORIGIN IN INDIA IS ESTABLISHED

BERLIN, Jan. 23—(U.P.)—The scientific researches, made in the German prison camps during the war, have led to numerous amazing results. Best known is the "museum of voices," the collection of records of innumerable languages, in

which men of all countries gave examples of their native idioms and dialects. One of the most interesting discoveries made refers to the Gypsies and throws light on the origin of this mysterious nomad people.

The Gypsies as is hinted in their name, were believed to be of Egyptian origin. Their leaders, when they first came to Europe in the 15th century, called themselves Kings and Dukes of Little-Egypt. Now the

linguistic researches have proved that they really originated in India.

Among the Roumanian and Russian prisoners, and those from the Balkans there was a sufficient number of Gypsies to enable the German scientists to study their language notwithstanding their efforts to guard their mysterious geneals. So it was possible to draw up a long list of words which were common to Gypsies from dif-

ferent countries and which all correspond to sanscrit words. Thus the Gypsy says "kast" for timber, while the old Indian word is "kastha." The respective words for coal are "angar" and "angara," and the denominations for numerous other things are just as similar.

While thus the origin of the Gypsies was scientifically fixed, it was also possible, by a study of their proverbs, poems and legends to show why they have

become the prototype of the "bohemien."

They have an inborn aversion to sedate home-life and repay the contempt of orderly people by despising the "bourgeois." Their vocabulary for the representatives of the law is rich and not without irony. For example, the burgomaster is called "fat gentleman" or "fat belly."

Like the "bohemien" the Gypsies are artists, and include

musicians who play every tune without being able to read a single note. Music is one of the few things in life to which they attach importance, for their mode of living prevents them from taking up any work of profession.

The philosophy of the Gypsies is best summed up in the following proverb: "Only three things make life worth living, to fiddle, to smoke and to sleep."
