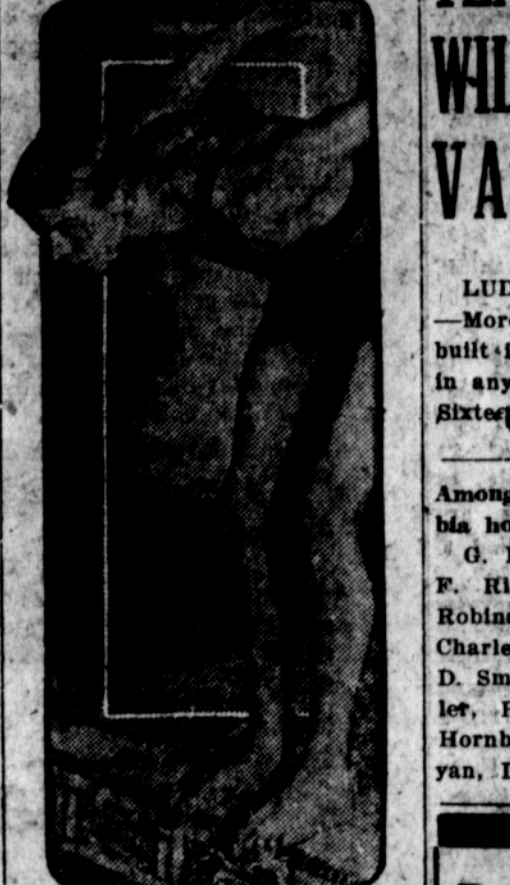

TEXAS ROADS WILL OPEN UP VAST TRACTS

LUDBOCK, Jan. 22.—(U.P.)—More railroad mileage will be built in Texas during 1925 than in any other state in the Union. Sixteen different projects of large systems, totalling approximately 2,500 miles, are now awaiting approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

While most of these lines are extensions they will give new life to a vast territory which otherwise would have gone undeveloped, due to lack of railway facilities. Agriculture products will be increased immeasurably along with shipping, commerce and population.

A dozen towns have sprung up and the plains have become dotted with farm houses in the last few months in the territory between here and the Texas-New Mexico line since the opening of the Santa Fe railroad between here and Bledsoe, a distance of 70 miles.

Formerly this tract of land was practically useless except for grazing purposes. Immense ranches of 400 sections are being cut up into small farming tracts of from 160 to 640 acres. The soil is rich, fertile and level, and the rainfall is sufficient to grow cotton and other crops.

The new towns have organized chambers of commerce, built schools and churches and started newspapers. Only 137 voters were registered a year ago in one county, but this January more than 1,200 persons paid

poll tax. Banks, court houses and cotton gins have been built. Other vast plains sections now practically undeveloped await the coming of proposed railroads to spring to life as did the section west of Lubbock. Many towns in the panhandle section have railway stations but no railway in some sections farmers live a distance of 40 or 50 miles from a railway.

News of a favorable Interstate Commerce Commission decision upon petitions for railroads for these sections is awaited eagerly by the inhabitants of these vast open spaces.

Lane County has 1500 miles of roads, more than 50 per cent being gravel or better.

LENIENCY OF COURTS TERMED CHIEF CAUSE MOST COUNTERFEITING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(U.P.)—Leniency by the courts is partially responsible for the increased activity by counterfeiting rings, according to William J. Moran, chief of the Treasury Secret Service.

"The sentence imposed on counterfeiters," Moran said, "are not as severe as they used to be. The old-line crooks, such as burglars, hold-up men and thieves generally, up to within five or six years ago, fought shy of Federal offenses. But that is not the condition now."

Since the Volstead Act was enacted, Moran believes the counterfeiting bands have not been fearful of the United States Courts.

"Counterfeiting today," Moran said, "is about as extensive as I have ever known it, in volume. The character of counterfeiters, however, is quite poor."
