LIQUOR PAPER IN ATTACK ON PROHIBITION

LONDON, Jan. 23.—(U. P.)—Declaring that the United States should not be admitted to any League of Nations "until it can stand up to its liquor" an English liquor trade journal has launched the bitterest attack ever made in this country on American prohibition. The attack is being discussed today in England. Commenting editorially "Ridley's Wine & Trade Circular"—the most powerful organ of the liquor interests in England—says: "The attempt to enforce compulsory Teetotalism in 110,000,000 citizens, mostly white, is not only causing the United States hundreds of millions of dollars in loss of revenue from alcoholic beverages, but is costing at least fifty million dollars a year for extra administrative expenses. "The principal loss however, is in the 'morale' of the nation, which is being badly shaken by Prohibition. At the same time American citizens have become the laughing stock of the world. "The American Nation, mostly of European extraction, have solemnly announced to the civilized world that they in America have become such Americanized beasts that they cannot be trusted even with so little as a glass of ale, because of the certainty that the mark of the American beast would show forth in them, and under the influence of Alcohol they would run out and commit some crime. "Such people, have placed themselves outside the pale of civilization, and under no circumstances should the American State be admitted to any league of civilized nations until it can stand up to its liquor with decency and self control. For a State of citizens who cannot control themselves in the moral sphere ought not to be placed in the position of administering the affairs of other nations."

HOTEL NEEDED, OLD BOAT IS REMODELED

TAMPA, Fla., Jan. 23.—(U. P.)—Yankee ingenuity has been brought into play to solve the shortage of hotel quarters here. The problem was to put up a hotel quickly. This was impossible, because of the embargo which has been holding up building materials. Also sites were expensive. At last a hotel project apparently required several months time. But Captain John McCaffrey of New York City accomplished the apparently impossible. He put in a hotel at Tampa in less than two weeks. It was a floating hotel. The new hostelry once was the Mississippi River side-wheeler "Harry G. Drees." The old steamer had put in many years of faithful service on the Mississippi River. It was built when ships were made to last and after a painting and varnishing, the Harry G. Drees was as "ship shape" as any hotel. McCaffrey had one big obstacle to overcome. That was to get the "floating hotel" to Tampa from New Orleans. Built for the quiet waters of the Mississippi, the boat, river men predicted, would be swamped in a fair sea. The new floating hotel is 200-feet long and contains 78 staterooms, a spacious dining room and lounging and sun rooms on both the fore and after decks. The ship is steam-heated and lighted by electricity from a power plant in the engine room. The demand for hotel rooms here is sufficient to fill the Henry G. Drees immediately which opens the way for McCaffrey to collect dividends on his ingenious investment.

GUNMEN MURDER KELSO POLICEMAN

KELSO, Jan. 23.—(U. P.)—Two unidentified gunmen shot and perhaps fatally wounded D. L. Bailey, west side patrolman here early today. The desperadoes escaped in the darkness toward Longview. One is believed to be wounded. Bailey and C. L. Huntington, night sergeant, saw them in a doorway of a west side pool hall, and when they stopped their automobile to question them, were greeted with a fusillade of gunfire. Bailey was shot through the chest and leg.

(Continued from page 1.) degrees and other tributes in his journey. Upon leaving, he expressed himself as willing, in his old age, to settle in America if circumstances should so turn. Cardinal Mercier was born November 22, 1851, in a little town near Waterloo. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1874 and three years later was made a professor in the Malines University. In 1886 he was appointed domestic prelate and in 1907 became cardinal. In the years since the war, the cardinal had suffered two illnesses. The first was in 1922 when he was taken with influenza and the next in December, 1925, when he was afflicted with ulcer of the stomach. Cardinal Mercier will be buried in the Archiepiscopal of Strombau and Machlin, seat of the Cardinal primate in Belgium.
