RUSSIAN M. D. GRAFTS DEAD BONES ON MAN

BERLIN, Jan. 27—(U. P.)—Russian surgery is now oc-

cupied with experiments in grafting corpse bones on to living human beings.

Appearing before the Military academy of Medicine in Leningrad, Professor Opej exhibited a woman corpse to whose body he had transplanted a bone previously removed from a corpse. The patient had suffered from tuberculosis of the knee-joint, and all medical treatment proved unavailing.

Removing from a corpse the shin-bone and adjacent sections of the hip, Professor Opej had boiled these in a special chemical solution and then grafted them on to the patient, whose corresponding bones had been amputated.
