ENGLISH WANT A HOOVER TO CURB WASTE

LONDON, Eng., Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Industrial England is raising a demand for an English Hoover to bring more profitable order out of the present duplication and waste in English industry.

The American Hoover is far from popular here, especially since his recent attack on the British rubber monopoly, but this has not been allowed to disguise the need for a similar influence in English commercial life.

Since the dawn of the new year the demand for order has increased notably and has resulted in the demand for organization and waste elimination from many different sources.

An expert "advisory council" for the chemical trades to investigate the wasteful duplication now going on, has been proposed. This council would investigate all applications from industrial plants for special "credits" from the government and would approve only those in which the plants showed some capacity for eliminating waste, scrapping extravagant or out-of-date machinery and competing successfully with Americans, German and other first-rate plants.

The government, it is felt, should demand for less taxation, and a lot of it.

Cool-owners want a return to the 8-hour day. Miners want the poor mines closed and the good mines equipped with better machinery, together with the "nationalization" of the "royalties" now paid to the owners of the ground through which the mines are dug.

There is a general demand, led by Lord Rothermere, for the production of electricity at the mouth of the mine, so that the cost of electric power may be vastly reduced, enabling British workshops to compete with those abroad.

The ship-building trades protest against special government "credits" to their members, on the grounds that ship-building is uneconomic at this time, until the world's surplus shipping is absorbed, and claim government credits serve merely to prolong wastefully a situation which must be left heroically to cure itself.

CRUSADES TO BE REVIVED

LONDON, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—The Crusades will be revived this spring by the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem.

One hundred Knights and Ladies of the ancient order, one of the two founded in Jerusalem during the crusades, have chartered a ship for a pilgrimage to some of its former strongholds in Jerusalem, Cyprus, Rhodes and Malta.

Neither King George V nor the Prince of Wales, both of whom belong to the Grand Priory of the Order, will be able to go, but the party will include some distinguished English names including the Countess of Cromer, the Dowager Countess of Airlie, Countess Haig, Lady Nunsborough, Lady Margaret McRae, the Earl of Scarborough, Viscount Galway, Lord Lamington, Lord Treowen and Major General Sir Thomas Yarr.

The pilgrimage starts from Venice on March 7 in the Steamship Asia which will fly the tattered banner of the Order as ensign. Under an old British Admiralty order which has never been repealed, all British ships are required to salute the flag of the international signal-book has long ceased to include the banner of the order among the flags likely to be encountered

at sea so that it is doubtful if many of the British vessels in the Mediterranean will recognize the ensign when they see it.

The order had its origin in Jerusalem and Acre, as an international lay co-fraternity for the relief of the Crusaders. Later on it was sovereign over Rhodes and Malta where its Knights kept galleys and galleons to attack the Barbary Corsairs and to prevent the spread of Turkish rule in the Mediterranean. This lasted until

1798. Today, more prosaically but still historically true to its original aims, the Order controls and supports the St. John's Association Ambulance and Brigade in Jerusalem as well as the Ophthalmic Hospital there. The English chapter includes

Knights of Justice, Knights of Grace and Esquires, as well as Ladies of Justice and Ladies of Grace. These distinctions, though officially recorded in the London Gazette, do not confer any rank or title, merely an opportunity for doing good. The ribbon is small and black.
