Cincinnati To Be Real Factor In 1926 Race

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 — (U.P.) — Cincinnati has become a real factor in the 1926 National League pennant race by purchasing Wally Pipp from the New York Yankees.

Since the demise of Jake Daubert, several years ago, the Reds have been without a first class first baseman and the management of the club had made many and futile efforts to fill a hole in one of the most important places in the infield.

Several propositions, it was understood, were made by the Cincinnati owners to the New York Giants for young Bill Terry, who worked at first during most of the 1925 season when George Kelly was playing second and the outfield.

The Giants, however, insisted that Eddie Roush, the star centerfielder for the Reds, would have to be included in any deal that might be made and Garry Herrmann, boss of the Cincinnati club, refused to consider any such a proposition and the negotiations failed.

Pipp is a good ball player and one of the finest characters in baseball. He is generally regarded as a veteran because he was the only player remaining on the club that the two daring Colonels, Ruppert and Huston, bought some time ago.

He is only thirty-one years of age, however, and as he always has taken good care of himself, he ought to have many years of good baseball left in him.

The Reds have the best pitching staff in the National League but the lack of hitting has kept the club out of the pennant race since 1919. Pipp is not a Babe Ruth but he was ranked as one of the most dangerous hitters in a pinch in the American League.

Several years ago, Urban Shocker, who was pitching then for the St. Louis Browns, happened to be sitting in the press box at the Polo Grounds during the second game of a double header against the Yankees.

He had pitched the first game and won it and he wanted to work in the second game but Lee Fohl, who was then managing the Browns, wouldn't let him work.

Shucks Pruett was sent to the mound and he fanned Babe Ruth three times during the game. It was considered some what of an accomplishment.
