Last Ten of Miners in an Alabama Mine Blownup Have Been Found

17 FOUND AT FIRST

Four Killed in Cave in Zinc Mine at Miami, Okla. Work of Rescuing Held up

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 30—The death toll in the gas explosion in the Premier mine was brought to 27 today when the searchers found 10 additional bodies, for whose rescue slender hope was held at the beginning of the search early this morning. Seventeen bodies had already been taken from the mine.

OREGON SECOND IN TELEPHONE INCREASE ON PACIFIC COAST

SALEM, Jan. 30.—Oregon ranks second in point of increase in telephone users during 1925 among states served by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, according to a report filed with the public service commission here. California ranks first in total increase as well as in percentage increase, with Idaho third, Washington fourth and Nevada fifth.

Among the various cities of the Pacific coast Portland ranks fifth, being outranked by Oakland, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle.

Among Oregon cities, outside of Portland, Eugene shows the greatest increase in telephone subscribers, with a total of 583 additions in 1925, although it ranks only seventh in percentage of increase, being outranked by Durkee, Warrendale, Oswego, Carlton Ashland and Toledo.

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BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 30—(U.P.)—Fighting for the lives of 10 men, with only slender hopes of success, rescue workers today continued their efforts to rescue the miners trapped in the Premier Coal company mines of Mossboro.

The explosion trapped 27 miners in the ill-fated mine late yesterday. Seventeen bodies have already been taken out.

MIAMI, Okla., Jan. 30—(U.P.)—Four miners were killed in a cave-in at the Cardinal Zinc mine today. Rescue workers were held up in their efforts because of a second cave-in which injured one of their party. None of the dead has been identified.
