ARMY FUNDS ARE ABOVE THE BUDGET

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 4 (U.P.)—The army appropriation bill, carrying \$339,581,924, an increase of \$1,087,699 above the budget estimates and \$895,293 above the appropriations for the current year, was reported to the house today by the appropriations committee.

Of the total, \$261,081,196 will be used for military activities, while the remainder, \$78,500,755, for non-military activities, such as maintenance and improvement of river and harbor projects.

opening of the local normal on June 21. By this method, Mr. Churchill draws his salary as superintendent, his salary as president of the local normal does not begin until June 21, and the normal school fund is saved—the \$400 or \$500 a month which would be a necessary expenditure if Mr. Churchill resigned as superintendent, a successor was appointed and Mr. Churchill had to move to Ashland immediately and maintain an office here in which to conduct the work that he can easily conduct in the superintendent's office.

Mr. Fuller's statement is as follows: "I notice that some individuals and papers in the state are undertaking to criticize the action of J. A. Churchill in retaining the office of superintendent of education since being elected to the position of president of the Southern Oregon Normal School. As a matter of fact, to those conversant with the situation, this action is in harmony with the wishes of the board of regents of the Normal School, is in line with economical administration, is a saving to the taxpayers of the state, and is highly commendatory in Mr. Churchill.

val and aerial units along about the same lines as the Washington conference and who insist that the moral obligation existing under the covenant for mutual assistance is sufficient without detailed obligations. The South Americans, who while strong for disarmament, insist that as in many cases their military and naval organi-

zations which they have at the present time are not adequate for national defense they cannot accept limitations that would curtail what development is necessary for their needs. The new maritime nations that came out of the war, which possessing sea ports, but no navies yet, insist that restrictions must not be placed on them that would prevent their building up a marine adequate for their national defense. These nations include Yugo-Slavia, Poland and Roumania.

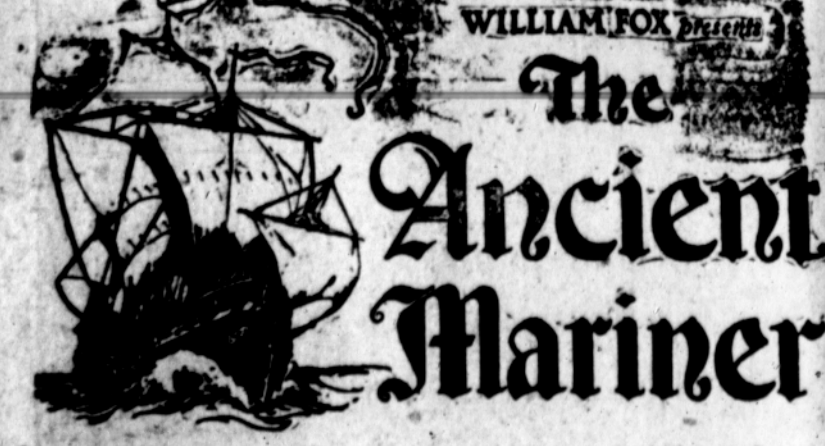
