DIAMOND LAKE TO ALWAYS BE GOOD FISHING IS REPORT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 5—Phil Motschenbacher, for 3 years superintendent of the Diamond lake egg taking station and fish hatchery, yesterday submitted his resignation to the state game commission, to take effect immediately. His resignation was impelled by a desire to join his father in the development of the rich agricultural land of lower Klamath lake.

"Diamond lake will never be fished out as long as they continue to plant a million fish each year," Motschenbacher said. "Just as long as they replenish the supply of fish each year, there is not a chance for the lake to be fished out. The lower half of the lake is closed, and that factor also enters into the preservation of the lake as a sportsman's paradise.

"They ought to have a good year at the hatchery. The first million fish planted, are now mature or four pounds in weight. "I think, though, that they should cut down the limit of fish, the number I mean. They shouldn't allow over ten or eleven fish caught, with the weight limit ten pounds.

"My experience in the service of the game commission has been that the best way to get anywhere with them is to cooperate. It is impossible to get anything if you cuss them out." Mr. Motschenbacher in his three years' service as superintendent of the Diamond lake hatchery, has taken literally millions of eggs. The highest number of eggs taken in one season was 17 millions, which established Diamond lake as the greatest trout egg-taking station in the world. His father is M. M. Madschenbacher, president of the Klamath Drainage district and prominently identified with reclamation of land in lower Klamath lake.
