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EXPERT TO AID GOLF BOOSTERS CHOOSING SITE

Five Courses South of City Are Now Under Consideration

ENTHUSIASM IS HIGH

Committee to Further Plans This Week—To Attract Tourists

Ashland's golf enthusiasts today could vision the bag of gold at the end of the golf course rainbow.

With five tracts under consideration, and with interest in the golf club mounting daily, members of the site committee announced that some day this week a golf expert will be brought to Ashland to aid the committee in the selection of the best possible site. Members of this committee are Harry Tomlinson, chairman; Henry Galey and Will Dodge.

All of the sites are located south of the city, and are either on the Pacific highway or visible from the highway. The site committee and others interested in the formation of a golf and country club feel that the golf course should be located south of the city by reason of the fact that much of the auto tourist travel comes to Ashland from the south, and a good golf course greeting the tourists as they entered the city would cause many of them to remain over here and take advantage of Ashland's numerous attractions.

The site committee will confer during the early part of the week and select an experienced golf expert to advise with it in the selection of the best possible site.

SEATTLE FISHERMAN KILLS HIS PARTNER ABOARD THEIR BOAT

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Shooting and killing his partner on their fishing boat in Lake Union early today, Leonard Tyree, 42, sped off in the launch with the dead man aboard. He led the lake patrol a hard chase until he voluntarily landed and surrendered himself to the police.

The dead man is Charles Shelhorn of Medicine Hat, Alberta. Tyree was placed in jail on a charge of murder. He said he and his partner had been quarreling and that Shelhorn struck him during the argument.

FLU EPIDEMIC HITS STATE PENITENTIARY

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—More than forty convicts were in the state prison hospital today suffering from intestinal flu, which has swept through the gray walls of the penitentiary, according to announcement by J. W. Lillie, warden.

As yet there are no serious cases and many of the men are on the road to recovery, the warden said. The epidemic, however, has cut down the production of the various plants.

COAL 'BOOTLEGGING' TAKES ANOTHER LIFE

WILKES BARRE, Pa. Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Anthracite "bootlegging" operations claimed another victim today.

Adam Jankoski, 50 a striking miner, was killed just before he started on the day's operations when dynamite he was thawing over a store exploded.

The man's wife and 16 year old daughter Helen were badly burned, while a son, Joseph, 12, escaped unhurt, although blown through the window of an adjoining room.

With anthracite selling at \$14 a ton, the operation of old abandoned claims has proved profitable to miners engaged in the "bootlegging."

Ashland Leading All of Oregon for Car Registrations

Ashland registered more non-resident cars in December than any other city in the state, according to figures received here today from Secretary of State Sam A. Koser. During the final month of the past year, 446 cars from other states or countries were registered in this city, his report shows.

The total non-resident registrations for the entire state in December amounted to 2394, with a total of 2,713 for the entire year.

The figures show that Medford had the second highest registration with 278 during December. Grants Pass was third with 249.

SUPREME COURT ASKED TO HALT KELLOGG'S PLAN

World Court Adherence Declared Violation of Constitution

LEGAL BATTLE STARTS

Washington Lawyer Wants Tribunal to Pass on Peace Question

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8—(U.P.)—The United States supreme court today was asked to restrain Secretary of State Kellogg from carrying out steps to complete American adherence to the world court.

Benjamin Catchings, a Washington lawyer, filed a petition with the court asking that Secretary Kellogg be restrained because the world court protocol, if adhered to, will create a tribunal higher than the United States supreme court itself, and will delegate the sovereign powers of this country to the world court in violation of the constitution of the United States.

The petition will be formally submitted to the court at its next open session, Monday, March 1.

PIONEER WOMAN PASSES SUNDAY

Mrs. Rosa Ellen Sloan, aged 88, for 30 years a resident of Ashland, died at the family home, 440 Helman street, at 1 o'clock Sunday morning. Funeral services were held this afternoon from the H. C. Stock chapel with a Christian Science service. She was laid to rest beside the body of her husband, M. L. Sloan, in Mountain View cemetery. Mr. Sloan died in 1914.

Mrs. Sloan was a native of Kentucky, having been born at Bronston, Ky., Sept. 17, 1838. She is survived by five children. They are Miss Mary Sloan and Mrs. Louis Boslar, both of Ashland; Mrs. S. S. Hill of California, and Allen and Robert Sloan, both of Klamath Falls.

BANKS TO BE CLOSED LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY

All Ashland banks and public offices generally will be closed all day Friday, which is Lincoln's birthday.

Although a non-judicial day, Lincoln's birthday anniversary is not a school holiday, and the public schools will remain open as usual, it was announced today by George Briscoe, city superintendent of schools.

All of the schools, including the high school, will hold a Lincoln day program of from 30 minutes to one hour's duration, he said. On Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, the schools will meet in the morning for an hour for a patriotic program and will then be dismissed for the remainder of the day.

NEW PASTOR COMES TO LOCAL CHURCH

William A. Carter Will be Candidate For Governorship

William A. Carter, former resident of Jackson county, and now a well known attorney of Portland, will seek the republican nomination for governor. Formal announcement of his candidacy was made by Mr. Carter in Portland Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Carter is a native of Tennessee, where he was born in 1874. He came to Jackson county in 1892 and read law in the office of J. L. Hammersley at Gold Hill. During his residence in this county he took a prominent part in political affairs and represented this county in the state legislature in 1891.

He moved to Portland in 1908 and has since been continuously engaged in the practice of law in that city.

In announcing his candidacy for the governorship, Mr. Carter declared that all of the leading state offices are now held by men outside of Portland, and his campaign will be based somewhat on the claim of Portland and Multnomah county to representation in the state capitol.

Revenue Officers Placed on Trial

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Charges of conduct unbecoming officers which were filed recently against Lieutenant Commander W. P. Wishaar, master of the coast guard cutter Algonquin, and Lieutenant C. P. Smith, chief executive officer, were brought to trial by court martial today aboard the cutter.

The charges against Lieutenant Smith are being considered first. He and Wishaar are accused of manipulating bids for the repair of the Algonquin a year ago by a Portland concern. It is charged a Seattle firm submitted the lowest bid.

DISABLED SHIP SINKS; ENTIRE CREW IS SAVED

Steam Schooner Yosemite Goes on Rocks Off Point Reyes, Cal.

HAD DYNAMITE CARGO

Sinks to Bottom While Three Miles Outside the Golden Gate

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Within three miles of the Golden Gate, the steam schooner Yosemite which went on the rocks off Point Reyes, tearing a big hole in her hull, sank today while under tow by the tug Sea Ranger.

The schooner, loaded with dynamite and percussion caps, and destined for Point Ludlow, Wash., went on the rocks early Sunday morning five hours out from San Francisco. She began filling immediately.

Crew Rescued

The schooner Willamette, four miles away, picked up an S. O. S. call and rushed immediately to the aid of the stricken steamer. The Willamette picked up the crew of 28 men of the Yosemite without injury or loss of life.

The Yosemite was almost submerged when taken in tow by the Sea Ranger. The tow line was 1,000 feet long as the Sea Ranger feared to get closer because of the ever constant menace of the Yosemite's cargo.

Sinks From Sight

The disabled ship proved a troublesome captive as only her masts and a part of her stack and rail were above water. The tug made but three knots an hour all day yesterday on the wearisome trip back to San Francisco. Almost hourly the disabled schooner sank lower and lower until this morning, just outside the Golden Gate, she sank completely from sight.

Too Many Bribes Cut Profits For Coast Rum Head

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Bribes and "splits" took the bulk of his huge profits in the liquor business, Roy Olmstead, alleged king of the Pacific coast rum runners, told Patrolman R. F. Baerman in a conversation which E. F. Carruthers, federal agent, overheard, according to Carruthers' testimony from the witness stand today. Olmstead and more than a score of his reputed employes and agents are on trail in federal court here for alleged conspiracy to violate the national prohibition law.

Carruthers testified that the conversation occurred after Baerman and another officer had "knocked over" one of Olmstead's men and Olmstead was trying to get him released. Olmstead is a former lieutenant on the Seattle police force.

WIDELY KNOWN CITIZEN DIES

J. P. Hollmeyer Passes Away Sunday at Family Home

J. P. Hollmeyer, widely known Ashland grocer and a man who had taken an active part in numerous civic affairs, passed away, at the family home, 110 North Main street, at 7 o'clock last evening. He had been in ill health for several months. Funeral arrangements are in charge of J. P. Dodge and Sons, and the funeral service will be announced later.

Mr. Hollmeyer was 52 years old and a native of West Virginia where he was born in 1874. He came to Ashland with his family from Chicago four years ago and at once identified himself with the city's civic builders.

He is survived by his wife and daughter, Florence, both of this city. Other surviving relatives are a brother, Arthur Hollmeyer of Englemin, Cal., and a brother-in-law, S. Stanley of Santa Barbara.

MANY LAWYERS ARE SEEKING JUDGESHIP IN PORTLAND COURT

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—There is a wild scramble among local attorneys for the post of judge of the court of domestic relations, made vacant by the resignation last week of Judge Jacob Kanzler, who has presided since the judgeship was first created. Judge Kanzler is leaving public service to enter the banking business.

John Van Zante is said to have the inside track on the place, as he has the backing of social welfare workers throughout the city. Joseph L. Hammersley, chief deputy district attorney, is said to be another strong candidate.

Western Oregon Nearly Back to Normal After Huge Rainfall

Father Fails to Save Daughter; Springfield Mill Shuts Down

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Western Oregon was nearly back to normal today after several days of hectic experiences with heavy rains and wind storms. Railway and wire communication was generally on schedule in every part of the state, although high water is still causing some inconvenience.

Scio Flooded

SCIO, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Thomas creek overflowed its banks early today, flooding Scio and many neighboring farms. Although the property damage was considerable, there was no loss of life reported.

Girl Drowns

MILTON, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—Gladys Massie, aged 16, was drowned Sunday night when she slipped from a foot bridge into the swollen waters of the Little Walla Walla river. The girl and her father, George Massie, were on their way to church at the time of the tragedy. The father caught hold of the girl's clothing as she fell from the bridge, but the swift waters tore her from his grasp. The body was recovered less than two hours later.

Mill Shuts Down

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 8—(U.P.)—High water today caused a partial shutdown of the big sawmill of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company here. It will be several days before the plant will be operating at normal capacity, it is believed.

FILM ACTOR RUSHES SOUTH WHEN MOTHER IN LAW IS KILLED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 8—Kenneth Harlan, film actor, left here by auto yesterday for Hollywood on receipt of word that Mrs. H. Provost, his mother-in-law, had been killed in an automobile accident in the South. The film actor's wife, Marie Provost, noted film actress, wired him to rush home at once.
