

YOUNG PEOPLE ARE DEFINED

Staunch defense of the young people of today is made by Mrs. Jessie Dodge, vice-president of the Ashland Parent-Teacher association, in a recent article in the Christian Science Monitor, in which she proves herself a loyal friend of the boys and girls of today.

Following is the article of her authorship as it appeared in the Christian Science Monitor:

I was very much interested in the Sundial article in your paper of the 28th of December and your suggestion in the edition of the 26th that a series of articles might be written on "What Is Right With Our Young People." I have watched this matter carefully for the past few years and have made some personal investigations at some of our schools. The conclusions I have reached are summed up below.

The youths of today are headed, think for themselves and have high ideals. They are accused of being brazen in undesirable habits of customs, but they are not brazen so much as they are absolutely frank and open, and have a complete disregard of the public's knowing what they are doing. They are not sly or secretive; they simply do what they think of doing and do it openly.

We hear a very great deal about girls smoking, about petting parties, about late automobile rides, but a close survey of conditions on the western coast proves that the young people who indulge in these practices form a very small minority, and no publicity is given to the big majority of fine young men and women who are calmly and quietly leading sane and constructive lives.

The girls' college sororities on the Pacific coast for the most part positively forbid smoking among their members, prohibit night auto rides, aside from going to and from social affairs, and very emphatically frown on "petting." In many of the men's fraternities the members do not smoke, and the houses advise the initiates against it.

A great many of the college students of the west earn their way through school. It would be impossible for any student to keep up with his studies and make his living at the same time unless he were very much in earnest and lived a careful, clean life.

An incident which came to the writer's attention recently indicated that school students are working toward higher ideals. Two rival schools play against one another each season. A feeling of bitter resentment and antagonism had developed between them, and some unpleasant experiences had occurred. Shortly after the beginning of the 1925 football season a very disagreeable event took place between supporting factions of the two teams.

Feeling that matters would get much worse unless steps were taken to prevent such a thing, a meeting was called by the representatives of the student body of each school. At this meeting it was decided and unanimously agreed to do all possible to abolish and discourage any manifestations previous to games which would tend to cause unfriendly feelings between the supporters or members of the teams.

It was agreed that no iso-

gans with unclean or bitter meanings would be used, and that all games would in future be conducted in a manner to show only a desire for a friendly victory. Does not this incident prove that our young generation is working toward a worthy result?

There is far more right with our young people than is wrong, and the older generation should cease talking so much of the wrong they think they see, and place greater emphasis, that can be found if looked for, on the good.

WRESTLER GIVEN FORMAL BLESSING

ROME, Feb. 9.—(U.P.)—Cardinal Mafti of Pisa has recently shown his personal interest in sport, and in the art of wrestling in particular by sending the Italian Greco-Roman champion of Europe, Giovanni Ravechich his blessing and good wishes for success in the match with the Czechoslovak Kavan.

INFORMER IN RUM TRADE DISCLOSURE IS SHOT TO DEATH

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The way of the informer is hard.

Hans Fuhrman, former rum runner, whose disclosures caused the indictment of William V. Dwyer and 60 of his former comrades and associates, was found dead from a gunshot wound shortly after the indictments were returned, it was learned today.

The medical examiner's report gives the cause of death as "suicide." The dead man's wife believes he was killed by the men whose names he supplied to the government. She also says two prices were put on his head by bootleggers, aggregating \$35,000.

Fuhrman is described by United States Attorney Buckner as his most important witness in the forthcoming trials. The man formerly was a pilot of boats running liquor into Long Island from the rum coast. Then he turned informer, and as a reward for his services was made a dry agent.

MONTESSANO, Wash., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Searchers thus far have been unable to locate the bodies of Clifford Wilkins, 19, and Pat Willis, 17, who were drowned in the Chehalis river near Melbourne yesterday afternoon.

The youths were last seen about noon in a boat on the river. They never returned home thereafter. The boat was later found, bottom side up.

STATE MOTOR FUELS TAX IN PAST YEAR YIELDS \$3,127,188

SALEM, Feb. 9.—Users of gasoline and distillate paid the state of Oregon a total of \$3,127,188.27 during 1925 through the medium of the state tax of 3 cents a gallon on motor fuel oils, according to a statement prepared by Secretary of State Koser. This figure represents a gain of 17 per cent over the collections from this source for 1924, which totaled \$2,672,481.98.

The 1925 tax was based on the sale of 101,202,762 gallons of gasoline and 3,877,853 gallons of distillate.

plete appraisal of all lands listed for sale and to take such other steps as may be necessary to get the movement ready for the advertising campaign which will follow later in the spring.

The follow-up committee will work in conjunction with both the other committees in preparing for the land settlement work. Members of this committee are O. Arnsperger of Talent, chairman; Alex Sparrow of Central Point and H. E. Campbell of Eagle Point.

O. C. Boggs of Medford will be chairman of the general county committee. R. H. Boyle of Med-

ford and J. H. Fuller of Ashland were named secretaries of the different sections of the general committee, while W. H. Crawford was made an ex-officio member assigned to the follow-up committee.

The Portland chamber of commerce, which is sponsoring the land settlement fund for all of Oregon, will cooperate with the

county organization in this work, and it is expected that Arthur Foster will again be in the field here this summer.
