BUDAPEST, - (UP) - Hungary has adopted a novel profiteering law which, according to results already achieved, gives promise of great effectiveness in keeping prices down.

It provides that anyone who is convicted of profiteering or of collusion in price raising loses automatically his license to sell alcoholic drinks.
