FORMER ASHLAND RESIDENT HAS PORTLAND INTERVIEW

Dave P. Fox, former prominent Ashland resident who is now living in Portland, was made the subject of an interesting historical interview in a special article by C. M. Hisekell recently in the Portland Telegram.

Many Ashland residents remember the Fox family, and to them especially, the following article will be of interest: "On the 15th of this month Dave P. Fox will be 36 years old. He is the youngest of a family of 12 children and he has out-lived them all. He is a big man, of ruddy countenance, stands erect and in every way his appearance betrays his age. He was a Civil war soldier, but is not present at meetings of the Grand Army owing to no lack of affection for the old veterans, but because he does not seek the company of the very aged. One of his pleasant fancies is to favor youthful associations and to think young thoughts. He simply declines to accept the old age idea.

With one exception his relatives lived only to moderate ages. His grandmother on the mother's side, who was of the Pennsylvania Dutch family of Sechlers, lived to see her 104th year. They lived at Turbottville, in the Susquehanna valley. In the neighborhood lived Benjamin Frank Giltner, long one of Portland's valued citizens. When David Fox was 17 years old he got the western fever, probably from the surreptitious reading of one of the yellowbacks popular with the youth of that period. He wanted to see the woolly West. The family, of course, objected. A compromise was finally reached by which the Western trip was financed for both Dave and Frank, the family believing that Giltner, who was seven years older and of serious mind, would be able to look after the boy.

So the two young men came by way of the Isthmus of Pana-

ma to San Francisco, in 1857, where Fox got a job. Shortly afterward Giltner came on to Oregon, intending to teach school. In an old newspaper of that time is an advertisement that young Giltner printed setting pupils at Amity. Fox followed him to Oregon in 1858, and they settled at St. Helens. There the youthful Fox taught school three years and worked seven years in the pioneer mill owned by a man named Ladd, whose mill passed over to James and Welsh Muckles. Today Jim Muckles, too, is a resident of Portland.

In 1854 B. F. Giltner married Susan McBride and settled at St. Helens, where he opened a store. It was believed at that time that St. Helens was the permanent head of deep sea navigation and would become a big city, owing to the difficulty of ships getting over the St. Helens bar and the necessity of hawttering ships loaded at Portland. The Pacific Coast Steamship company built docks there, but Knighton, owner of the townsite, refused to sell certain lots and the upshot was that some time later the heart of navigation moved to Portland. The parents of B. F. Giltner came from Pennsylvania to Portland in 1855 and two years later David Fox married Kate Giltner, one of the daughters.

In 1875 David Fox and his wife went to Virginia City, Nev., following discovery of the Comstock lode in Davidson mountain. He remained there 15 years, trading in mining stock. He was well acquainted with John W. McKay and James Fair. These two men had been working as miners in Northern California and came to Virginia City at that time to work at \$4 a day in the new mines. They had a couple of saloonkeeper friends at San Francisco named O'Brien and Flood. Learning of the great richness of the mine in which they were working they went to Flood and O'Brien, who furnished them with money on a 50-50 basis, and they secured control of the Ophir and Consolidated Virginia mines. There were some 50 mines along the Comstock lode, says David Fox. Mackey and Fair became millionaires along with a good many others. Virginia City, now a town of 8000 then had 40,000 people and all the big show companies played there at \$4 and \$5 a seat.

"John Mackey was a fairly well educated man," says Fox. "His work was good. His wife was a Miss Hungerford, daughter of a country doctor, and when he married her he was a \$4 a day miner. She did whatever work there was for women to do in the mining camp. Mackey was a hard worker and well liked. Marcus Daly also mined there at \$4 a day. Afterward he went to Salt Lake and got a grubstake and went to Montana, where he discovered the Anaconda."

As the rule always works in the mining stock game, David Fox had his ups and downs. Some weeks he would make \$20,000, and then lose it. He made and lost several fortunes before he decided to settle down.
