SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—Charges that the government used a foundation of perjury upon which to build the Olmstead conspiracy cases were made by Defense Attorney George Vanderveer in a statement to the jury as the defense opened its case today.

## SCOUTS ENJOYING TARGET PRACTICE

Millard Grubb Putting Boys of Troop Two Through Their Paces

During the past four weeks, Millard Grubb has been taking a bunch of the Scouts of Troop Two through some real target practice at the Armory. There are four patrols in the Troop and each patrol is composed of eight Scouts. Last night, the two boys scoring the best in the separate patrol contests met for a final shoot to see which of the eight had the most on the target. The boys who qualified for this meet and the patrols represented are as follows:

Ten shots, with a possible 50 points, were allowed for each of two positions, prone and standing, making twenty shots for each Scout. Max Hoover took first place with an average of 41.5 for both positions. Wesley Hoxie and James Hartley tied at 41 average for second place, but in shooting of the tie, Hoxie edged in ahead of Hartley and is awarded second place. Wesley Hoxie and Harry Borah also qualified in their shooting for the marksmanship merit badge, a test open to those scouts who have passed all of the first class requirements. Last night's shooting was perhaps not

quite up to the best that some of the records made by some of the boys in the patrol contests, and on the whole, they have done pretty good work for amateurs.

## DAYLIGHT SAVINGS HURTS THEIR SLEEP

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10—(U.P.)—Early to bed and early to rise may not be the official slogan of San Francisco brokers, but nevertheless it is a part of the routine of their lives. And the "early to rise" part of it is driving them into politics.

San Francisco stock exchange members are planning initiative legislation at the next session of the legislature to provide for daylight savings time throughout the state in the summer months.

The complaint of the brokers is that they must leave their beds long before daylight because of New York daylight savings time. Ordinarily there is a difference of three hours in the time of the two states. In the summer when daylight savings time is effective in New York the difference is four hours.
