Dear Club Women:

Our January message went out in the form of a personal letter to each club president. It aimed to emphasize some of the responsibilities that face all of us during the last half of the year's work. Now as we are writing this word of greeting we are also busily preparing for the mid-winter board meeting. The chief item of interest at this session of the board will be the determination of the date and place for our next state convention. Both Bend and La Grange want the state convention and at either place we may expect a royal welcome, as well as every possible arrangement for convenience in the regular routine work of the convention.

Our first vice-president, Miss Grace Chamberlain, represented Oregon at the board meeting of the General Federation Jan. 12-16. Miss Chamberlain is expected home by Jan. 20. She will bring the latest reports on the biennial meeting scheduled for May 24-June 5. It is now too early to consider our delegation to Atlantic City biennial—the greatest biennial yet planned! It is expected that fifteen thousand delegates will attend. Please let us know of prospective delegates. We have hotel rate schedules, etc. which will prove helpful.

How many of you studied the list of 100 per cent subscribers to the Federation News published in the January issue? That list should grow each month even more rapidly than it has during the past six months. "Every club woman a reader of the News" would mean better club work, better team-work, better committee service within both State Federation and local club. Do you remember that being listed a 100 per cent subscriber means twenty points on your honor score card? People all over the state are slaying us up by our support of our own projects. They judge our possible power in our own community in the same manner.
