## STUDENTS HELD TRUE BELIEVERS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 11.—(Special)—Most students believe in some form of God, declared Sinfrosio G. Padilla, graduate student and assistant in the psychology department, who has prepared a questionnaire to determine to what degree people lose their religious beliefs. Padilla, whose work is called "The Psychological Study of Religious Beliefs" now being given to students, wants to find out whether persons become more irreligious as they grow older and obtain more education. He hopes to get sufficient material to defend young people and colleges of today from attacks made upon them by religious minded persons.

"Very few people are agnostics or infidels. Most people, in fact, who are real thinkers think of God. I am of the opinion that people do not lose their beliefs by becoming educated; they merely change them." The questionnaire embraces seven big topics, which are: God, Holy Ghost, Christ, Hell, Heaven, Immortality and the Devil. Under each topic there is a list of questions the answers to which are expected to give the individual's conception of these beliefs.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Entrance requirements for the University will be placed on a still higher plane, if a proposal introduced by Dr. George Rebec, dean of the graduate school, at the last meeting of the faculty, is adopted. A vote will be taken in March. Academic requirements for entrance, according to Dr. Rebec's proposal, will be the same, regardless of the school or department entered, and will be as high as any required now.


