### "THE NEXT WAR"

Quite frequently speakers and writers discuss the question of the "next war" and speculate whether or not the United States will get drawn into it.

There seems to be just one possible peril of war at this time. There is no conceivable danger that any country is going to attack the United States. It would be folly for any country to land an army on our shores, or send a fleet to attack our naval vessels, or bombard our cities. Just one chance that can be considered a possible danger exists.

And that is that the powers of Europe may get to fighting again as they did in 1914. If that happens, there is a possibility that our country might get drawn in, as it did in 1917.

If so, it would happen because our ships were sunk, or because American travelers were attacked when in some foreign country, or on the ocean. No amount of protection of our own shores could ward off that possibility. We might line our coasts with fortresses like Gibraltar, but the danger that American ships might be sunk by submarines of some fighting power, would continue just the same.

The United States does not want to become entangled in the quarrels of Europe, but whenever it does anything that helps reduce the war spirit it helps those conditions that might draw us into fighting again.

### PATHS OF EDUCATION

A young man can work his way thru college in 120 different ways, according to the manager of the employment bureau of the college of the City of New York. These boys who want an education but say they can't get it, should not admit failure so easily. Many thousands have done that thing.

Unless a boy has a distinct taste for book knowledge, he may be foolish for him to attempt the prolonged effort necessary for earning his way thru college. Perhaps he can come best to him thru the channel of observation and experience. But if he is going to regret that lack of education all his days he would better pluck up his courage and study these 120 paths to education. ### COUNTRY DANCES

### Valentine Dance

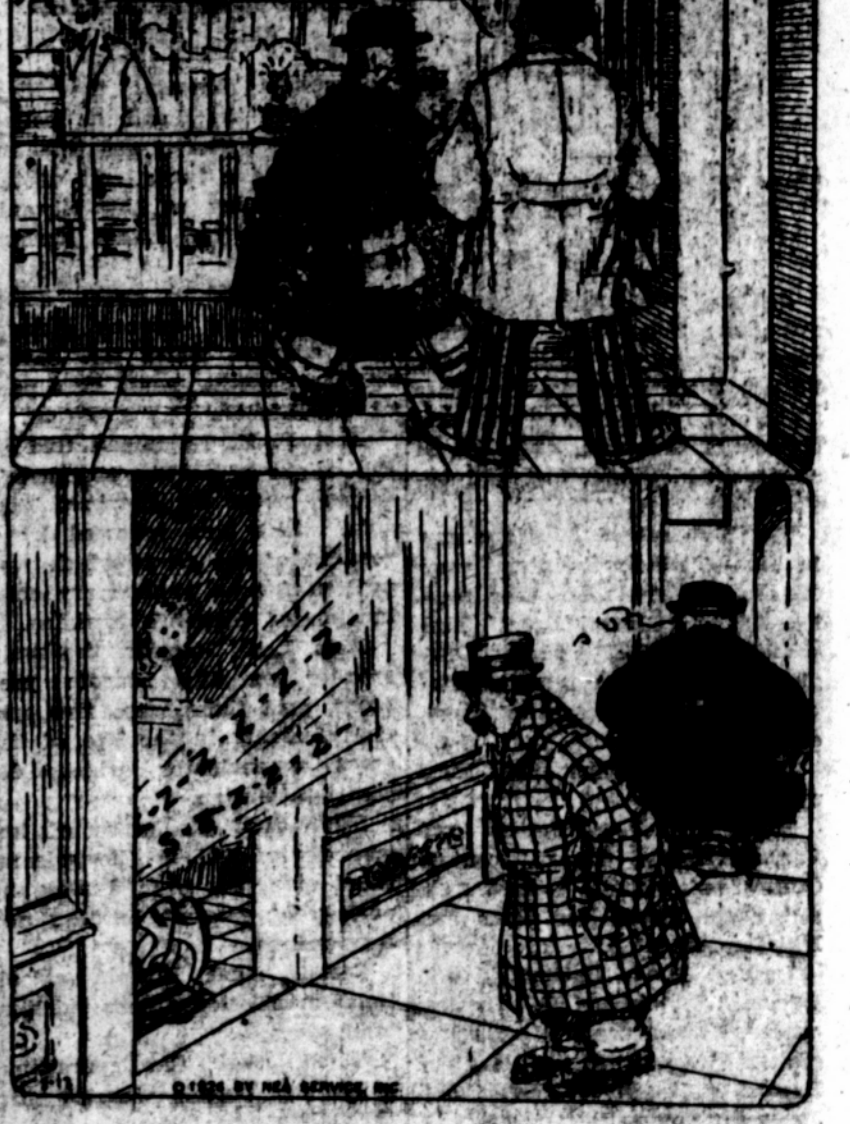
The St. Valentine's dance given by the St. Valentine's church was a decided success, according to those who attended. A very large crowd attended.
