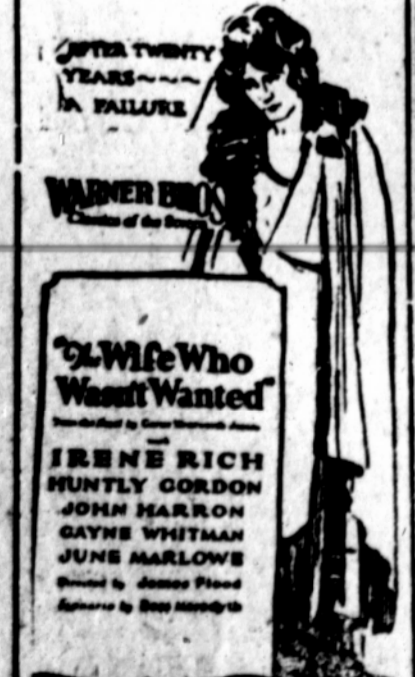

### BIG FOX FARM NOW UNDER WAY

AMERICAN FORK, Utah, Feb. 13.—(U. P.)—The school book stories of a generation ago which pictured the fox as a sly animal, adept in the art of stealing chickens, a proclaimer of sour grapes and worthy only of an over-sized charge of buckshot are all wrong, according to Robert L. Ashby.

"And I have bet considerable money that such is the case," said Mr. Ashby who, with as-sociates, has invested \$50,000 in black and silver Foxes, which will be used in developing a Fox farm at the outskirts of this city.

The Foxes now at the farm, numbering 48, are beautiful animals with a wondrous sheen to their silver and glossy black coats, and with big bushy tails which some day will turn back chilly blasts from the slender necks of American women. And the value of the animals is in keeping with their appearance. Three thousand dollars was the highest price paid by Mr. Ashby for a pair of Foxes, and the low-est figure was \$1,500.

Belonging to the dog tribe, the Fox suffers from fleas when running wild. But fleas do not survive on the pampered pets of the Fox farm. Carefully prepared solutions are used on the animals frequently and all pests or diseases, which might cause a Fox to scratch and thereby injure its gleaming fur, are eliminated.

According to Mr. Ashby the Fox is a very interesting crea-ture, and doesn't deserve the bad reputation given him by fanciful writers. "Supposing he does steal chickens," said Mr. Ashby. "It is only natural to provide for one's family. And a Fox is always loyal. He re-jects a wife early in life and never deserts her. Of course mating can be directed, so that the type pelt desired can be produced, but the Fox seldom remates." Due to this loyalty pelting is done in pairs.  
Foxes do better in cold climates and like the high altitude of northern Utah. They can be bred when ten months old and will have litters within a year. The litters are from one to 11.
