THE GATEWAY OFFICE

Recent press dispatches from Portland indicate that Klamath county chamber of commerce is making a mined effort to have the "Oregon Gateway" office ed this year from Ashland to the junction of the Parific and Ashland - Klamath highways, where, it is natural to presume, much more tourist traffic would be diverted to Klamath during the summer months.

There are many arguments against the location of the Gateway office alongside an oil service station on the highway, several miles from a city, but at the same time in our humble opinion it behooves the people of Ashland to be keenly alert to the situation and to make strenuous objections to this proposed change in the Gateway office.

Auto tourists do not want to be halted out on the highway where there is a general lack of tourist accomodations. Consequently, Ashland is the only logical location for this important office during the tourist months.

But seeking an opportunity to divert this auto tourist traffic, Klamath Falls is quick to grasp it. Ashland residents should register a vigorous protest which could be heard to the four corners of the state and thus block the attempt to take from Ashland that which is rightful-


