## INCOME TAX BLANKS MAILED BY HUNTLEY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, has mailed more than 40,000 federal income tax blanks to the smaller taxpayers of the state, covering earnings for the calendar year 1925. These forms must be filled out and filed in his office not later than March 15, accompanied by the payment of at least one-fourth of the amount of tax due. These blanks can be used only by salaried people and wage earners whose net income for the year 1925 did not exceed \$5,000. Blanks for the use of individuals engaged in a business or a profession or whose gross income was \$5,000, or more, regardless of their net income, or whose net income was in excess of \$5,000, are not obtainable at this time.

These blanks, as well as those required by corporations, will not be obtainable until the new revenue bill, which is now before a conference committee of the national congress, has finally been approved by both houses and signed by President Coolidge.

Under the provisions of the new revenue bill, returns must be filed by

1. Every single (unmarried) person, if unmarried throughout the year 1925, whose net income was \$1,500, or more.
2. Every single (unmarried) person claiming exemption as head of a family, whose net income was \$1,500, or more.
3. Every married person, if married throughout the year 1925, whose net income was \$3,500, or more, during the year.

The exemption allowed for dependents remains the same.

\$100 for each dependent under 18 years of age, or over 18 years of age if mentally and physically incapacitated.

## Spokane Man Is Killed In Fight

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 19.—During a dispute over rights to mining land near Pierce City, Idaho, Harry Wells of Spokane was shot to death. Demonic Devovich is held in jail in Pierce City and will be charged with the murder, according to Prosecuting Attorney Arthur Guerin of Orofino.

John Eaton of Spokane, who was on the claim with Wells, was alleged to have been attacked, but escaped without injury. According to meager telephonic details of the shooting, Wells and Devovich had had trouble for some time over the land in question. Wells, who is widely known here, had gone to Pierce City to do some work on the claim.

## The Dalles Voters Approve Bonds To Build Pipe Lines

THE DALLES, Feb. 19.—(U. P.)—In a special city election, voters of The Dalles authorized a \$125,000 bond issue for the construction of a new pipe line and storage reservoir. A \$250,000 bond issue for the erection of a city isolation hospital also carried. A \$5,000 bond issue proposal for a new city

park and an issue of \$1500 for the maintenance of a municipal band were rejected. The new pipe line, will be from Wicks reservoir to Sorosis park, where the new storage reservoir will be built. Principal and interest on the water bonds will be retired from income and without resort to taxation.

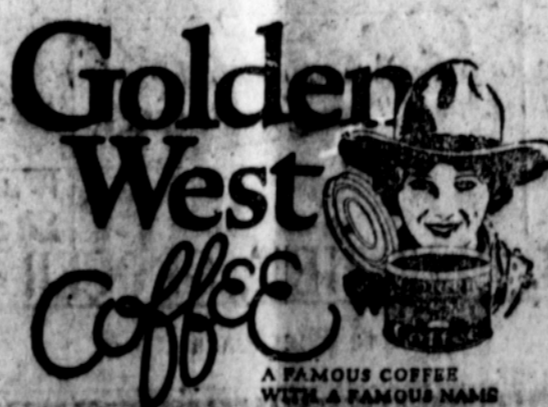
