This positive statement from the executive sets to rest any doubt as to whether he would run for governor or United States senator. It likewise gives credence to the report that Bert E. Haney will return to Oregon soon and announce his candidacy for United States senator on the democratic ticket.

Mr. Haney's resignation from the shipping board will begiven to President Coolidge this week, according to persistent reports coming from Washington, D. C. It is understood that he will leave at once with his family for Portland and will enter the senator-

It is thought here that Governor Pierce had positive knowledge of 7:30 o'clock. Mr. Haney's contemplated action and for that reason gave up all thought of the senatorial race and decided to seek another term as governor of Oregon.
