MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 22.—(U.P.)—All traffic over the Roseburg-Coos Bay branch of the state highway was blocked today by a massive slide 12 miles south of Marshfield on the Marshfield-Coquille paved highway. The slide also blocked the Southern Pacific right of way, but railway officials expected to have it cleared by tonight. The highway may remain closed to traffic for the remainder of the week.

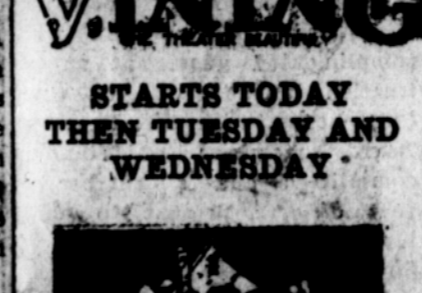
### Tilden Wins in Tennis Doubles
