MITCHELL FADING OUT

Eastern newspapers are pointing the finger of scorn or derision at Colonel Mitchell, because he is asking stiff prices for his public lectures on the American aircraft situation, and is reported to be refusing to speak unless he gets the money laid down on the counter.

We ought not to blame Mitchell for asking that his lectures be recognized as of monetary value. For it takes money for him to give them. It would be easily possible for a club in Oklahoma to ask him to happen in to dinner, from New York, and genially forget about the railroad fare and the hotel bills unless Mitchell had a business manager. One cannot be a nationwide influence without expense money.

What Mitchell should have thought of was whether, in the long run, he could be of greater service to his government, as an aircraft agitator, within the legitimate limits of army discussion, rather than as a bolshevist outsider. We predict that in six months Mitchell will be forgotten as a force in public opinion and that the government agencies will have gone ahead, accomplishing many of the things that he demanded, and showing that other things he demanded are unnecessary or objectionable. As a sacrifice to a cause, he will have the reward of self satisfaction. That he will get any permanent fame, to say nothing of money, is very doubtful.

FIXING THE BLAME FOR FIRES

The disposition to regard fires as the business of Providence and the insurance companies is giving way in some quarters to the idea of holding the culpable responsible. Inquiries received by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States indicate a growing interest on the part of member organizations in the possibilities of enacting legislation making those who through negligence or otherwise start fires personally liable for the damage they cause.

The personal liability theory prevails generally in European countries and has been endorsed by the National Chamber. The European property owner whose house or factory burns down must explain to the satisfaction of the civil authorities that he has done his best to prevent such a catastrophe. If he cannot, he might find himself obliged not only to stand the loss he has suffered but to reimburse his neighbors for the damages they have sustained. A fire is not only a misfortune but immediately raises the question of negligence.

REGULATING DANCING

A good many parents are worrying about the unregulated way in which their young people behave at dances, where there is often no supervision by older persons. Chaperons have gone out of date in many circles.

The women in some places are meeting this situation by planning carefully controlled assemblies, the same to be in charge of some competent instructor in dancing, who will regulate any of the young people who seem disposed to behave in an undesirable way. Young folks may think they would not have a good time at such a dance, but it really can be made pleasanter for them.

The selfishness often shown by the boys in choosing their partners makes an unregulated dance very unsatisfactory for many of the girls, but if the affair is controlled by some tactful instructor, the whole crowd will have a better time.
