MANY DELEGATES TO ROTARY CONVENTION

DENVER, Feb. 26. — (UP) — Thirty-three nations of the world represented at the International convention of Rotary Clubs to be held here next June, will have floats in a giant electrical pageant to be staged on the night of June 14.

The pageant will be headed by the famous Mexican national band of 45 pieces and will include 100 Blackfoot Indians in their original costumes. Other features of not will be a "song fest," in which noted boy bands from the United States and Canada will take part. The President's Ball, always a gala affair, will be held on the night of June 16.

On the afternoon of June 17, the "Wild West" will have its fling when a chapter of Cheyenne Frontier Days will be presented in Denver with bucking horses, roping and other phases of the sport.

Foreign visitors of note include the finance minister of Italy, from Milan; secretary of state of Czechoslovakia; a cabinet member from the court of Queen Wilhelmina, of Holland and leading diplomats from Ireland, Great Britain and other countries.
