With an abundance of speed, plenty of pep and splendid team work, Coach Hughes' Ashland high school basketball quintet overwhelmed Klamath high school champions of Klamath county, 44 to 7, at the local armory Saturday night.

TAX BILL IS ENDORSED BY REPUBLICANS

Jackson County Republican Committee Approves Stanfield Plan

COOPERATION IS URGED

Citizens and Taxpayers Asked to Aid in Procuring its Passage

Endorsement of Senator Stanfield's bill to procure for Jackson county approximately \$750,000 which represents the tax lost when the Oregon and California land grant lands reverted to the government was given by the Jackson County Republican Central Committee at a meeting Saturday afternoon.

The resolution urged the support of taxpayers and citizens generally in order that this payment might be procured for the county during the present session of congress.

Following is the resolution: WHEREAS, a certain Bill for the relief of counties in the State of Oregon within whose boundaries the reversioned California & Oregon Railroad Company grants are located, has been introduced in the Senate of the United States, and

WHEREAS, over one-half of the total area of Oregon is in the public domain, about one-half of which is reserved, but all untaxable, and

WHEREAS, the reversion in the United States of the title to the Oregon & California Railroad Company grant lands deprived many

Gerald Chapman Given Reprieve Until April 6th

HARTFORD, Conn., March 1.—Gerald Chapman, mall bandit and police killer, has at least another month to live. This was assured yesterday when Governor Trumbull signed another stay of execution, halting the death penalty until April 6. This is the third reprieve granted the notorious criminal. He was scheduled to have been hanged next Wednesday.

OFFICIALS IN KLAMATH SUED FOR DAMAGES

District Attorney, Sheriff and Justice of the Peace Involved

FALSE IMPRISONMENT

Former County Jail Inmate Makes Accusations Against Officers

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Mar. 1.—Three county officials unlawfully held John Lewis, laborer, nearly three months in the county jail, it is alleged in a civil suit filed on behalf of Lewis in the Klamath county circuit court by William Marx, his attorney. Damages totaling \$5,362 are asked jointly of the defendants.

District Attorney E. L. Elliott, Sheriff Burt E. Hawkins and former acting justice of the peace, E. X. Kendall, together with Angelo Bocchi, store keeper, are made defendants in the suit.

Lewis was jailed November 24 on complaint of Bocchi, but the complaint was never sworn to, according to Attorney Marx. He was released February 19, without having been given a trial or preliminary examination, it is alleged. Bocchi charged that

YOUTHS HELD FOR SLAYING AGED MAN

North Dakota Lads Admit Killing Victim During \$3000 Robbery

CARSON, N. D., Mar. 1.—(U.P.)—Charges of first degree murder were filed today against Adam Horst and William Stroller, both youths, who confessed Saturday to the murder of Fred Stroller, grandfather of William Stroller. The youths murdered the aged man, stole \$3000 in currency and then set fire to his house. Each of the boys blames the other for the actual killing. The money was recovered from the Horst home where the boys had hidden it.

TETANUS IS FATAL TO YOUTH AT BEND

Blank Cartridge in Rifle Causes Poison Which Proves Fatal

BEND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(U.P.)—Warren Bishop, 14, brought to Bend from Willow Creek, in Northern California, suffering from tetanus, died in the St. Charles hospital Saturday. This is the second death from tetanus in Bend in the past year, a woman dying here in 1925.

The boy was brought to Bend, a distance of 225 miles, from the California ranch to be given an antitoxin.

Cause of tetanus which resulted in the boy's death was the accidental discharge of a .22 blank cartridge.

KLAMATH WILL START BUREAU NEAR ASHLAND

Option is Procured on Helm Property at Junction of Highways

THOUGHT UNFRIENDLY

Action in Invading This Territory is Branded Bad Sportsmanship

In spite of the fact that it has been branded by other communities as an "unfriendly act," the Klamath chamber of commerce has taken up the option on the A. D. Helm property at the junction of the Pacific and Ashland-Klamath highways and is now completing plans for the establishment of its so-called tourist information bureau.

News to this effect was received today from Klamath Falls. The sum of \$5100 was subscribed chiefly through the Klamath chamber of commerce members in order to promote the enterprise. The Klamath people have procured a 10-year lease on the property.

For Klamath Only

To put it plainly, Klamath Falls wants to divert auto tourist traffic from the Pacific highway to Klamath county. Its information booth will be devoted almost wholly to Klamath propaganda and scant heed will be paid to the claims of other communities which seek to draw the auto tourist travel.

The Klamath News, whose managing editor claims parenthood of the information booth idea, comes out in this manner in speaking of the project:

"The plans for establishing a tourist bureau at the highway junction have been fully gone into and held feasible. Money put into the enterprise is returnable in full. The object is to divert traffic into Klamath county, and to advertise this county."
