### CONTROL BY FINANCIAL INTERESTS

The complaint is often made that the country has come under the domination of the big financial interests, and that they are shaping the laws and policies so as to favor the great corporations, with secondary regard to the ordinary run of people.

Wealth must be our servant rather than our master. But if wealth is regarded as an enemy, we can do with it as they have done in Russia, that is, confiscate it. The result is that capital cannot be obtained for industrial and public enterprises. This produces universal destitution and makes everyone worse off.

People of wealth often become so absorbed in the struggle to make good in the business world, that they do not see how human values are affected by their policies. A business may be very successful on the side of making dividends, but if it has not sold its goods at a fair price, if it has not provided healthful conditions and fair pay for its workers, then its results are not profitable to the country.

So the people who make the laws must be able to keep those two principles clearly in view. We must have business policies that will enable business to operate at a profit, but we must not forget that the welfare of the people is the object of all business. A business system is not satisfactory that just provides good times for a minority of the people. That prosperity must be communicated to the masses.

The mass of the people must co-operate heartily and cheerfully. There are many plans and theories that look fine on paper, but when they are tried out in actual operation, they do not fit the facts of human nature. We must place the management of things in the hands of people who have had practical experience in knocking up against the world and studying the popular psychology.

### DEFECTS OF RURAL CHILDREN

The U. S. Public Health service last year co-operated in giving physical examinations to 197,000 rural school children, of whom it was found that 112,000 had incapacitating defects.

These defects in many cases would have produced unfortunate results. Children who need spectacles and are not provided with them, are likely to injure their eyes and hamper their efforts permanently. Those with throat and nose defects may fail to obtain proper physical development, and thus drag thru the world in an ineffective way. Our educational system will not be any where near complete unless some provision is made for discovery of such defects, with some plan for following them up and urging negligent parents to have them attended to.

### HOME OWNERSHIP STRENGTHENS A NATION

The homes of the world are what the work of the world is done for. To build them and keep them is the first concern of a stable civilization. So essential to happiness are homes that many European countries have made their construction a public utility. There is no such need of paternalism here, where a liberty-loving people will provide its own homes without government subsidy.

A new spirit is born of ownership. There is dignity in a permanent settlement. It was the hand on the plow that made America great. What was owned was worth fighting for. In an industrial age, with population massed in cities, that proprietorship which steadied the farmer must be transferred to ownership of homes.

Home ownership means better citizenship. The family that the landlord is apt to discriminate against is encouraged in the home. In good home districts there is a dearth of juvenile delinquency. Anything that enhances the dignity of man enhances his character.

The proper time to begin to think about buying your own home is right now.

first to protest a year from today if it were proposed to do away with any of the improvements which might be made. I am in line with progress, and I moved out of that section of the city once because they didn't have any sidewalks. The reason Ashland isn't any larger than it is today is because you people have fought these plans for progress and development."

**A Losing Fight**  
But the mayor and council members were fighting a losing cause, and even the urgings of Don Spencer, mail carrier and property owner, went for naught. In fact, some of the protesting property owners sought to make it a personal matter between themselves and Mr. Spencer, but he insisted he was thinking only of the development of the city as a whole.

The council, however, was unanimous against taxing any declavie action. It was indicated another investigation would be made in an effort to put in the desired improvements on property where there would

be less objections.

The troubles of the De Ben Auto company were speedily settled when Ed High, local manager of the concern, was granted permission to put in a wooden approach to the sidewalk in front of the Weikle building, which will be used exclusively as a sales room. This permission was granted on the further condition that no demonstrators would be housed within the building and the cars taken out only when they are used. The company also agreed to put metal pans under every car to catch all dripping oil.

The proposal to establish the councilmanic city manager form of government was delayed for another two weeks on motion of Councilman Taylor, chairman of the ordinance committee. It is understood that several important changes are being made in the proposed ordinance before it is ready for final submission to the council. The committee promised to report within two weeks.

### To Buy Fire Hose

The council voted to accept bids for the purchase of 500 feet of fire hose at the meeting within two weeks. Representatives of the A. G. Long and Company and the Pioneer Rubber company of Portland submitted proposals last night but it was decided to call for sealed bids before taking definite action. In this connection, the fire chief and city recorder were directed to communicate with Pacific coast fire underwriters to learn whether or not the insurance rate in Ashland would be lowered if the city should get the new hose and put in other contemplated improvements, including the establishment of a group of new fire alarm boxes.

### Water Improvements

Water Superintendent Hozer was given authority to make a group of city extensions for the Talent irrigation district and to repair a bad leak in the lower reservoir. The work will cost approximately \$5,000, and the council voted to borrow the money from the light depreciation fund to carry on this work.

Mayor Johnson appointed Councilman Taylor, High and Peters as a special committee to investigate the advisability of putting in a crossing on Henry street between Beach and Northern in order to provide access to the normal school from that section.

### Garbage Disposal

The council will meet in special session next Tuesday night to consider the garbage disposal and incinerator problem. W. R. Hayter submitted a written offer to the council, agreeing to handle the garbage disposal under a five-year contract. His rates would be \$1 per month to residences and \$5 per month to business houses. Collections would be made weekly to residences during the winter and twice a week during the summer. Business house collections would be made daily. He offered to pay \$200 a year for the franchise. He also agreed to build an incinerator if the city would furnish the material, and he would retain all fees for the use of the plant. His proposal will be considered at the meeting Tuesday evening.
